**WELCOME VISITORS.** Welcome to Forks, home of the sportsman. Welcome to Forks, "steelhead capital of the world".

Visit with us and share the excitement of an old fashioned Fourth of July. Camp in one of many campgrounds surround- ing this frontier town. Walk our wilderness beaches or hike the trails to the Olympic backcountry. Fish one of many streams for cutthroat, rainbow, summer steelhead, whitefish or salmon. All streams will be open as of July 1st. Portions of these streams are open prior to the July 1st date.

Visit here and take in one of the many naturalist programs within the Olympic National Park. Campfire programs through- out the park are scheduled for 8:30 p. m., July 1 through July 31 and 9:00 p. m., August 1 through September 4. The only exception is at Kalaloch where the schedule reads: June and July, 8:30 p. m.; August and September, 8:00 p. m. These campfire programs in the Forks area may be found at Faldholm Campground on Lake Crescent, Soleloch Campground near the Sol Duc hot Springs, Mora Campground, Hoh Rain Forest, and Kalaloch Campground.

In addition to these nightly campfire programs, the Soleloch Campground offers a nature trail with booklets; guided forest and beaver walks are available at Mora; both guided and self guiding nature walks are offered at the Hoh Rain Forest, which also supports a visitors center; and Kalaloch offers both guided tidepool and forest walks.

In addition to the park campgrounds we also find those managed by the Washington State Department of Natural Resources, United States Forest Service, and U.T.T. (Raydoner, Inc. For a complete campground guide ask for your free "Vacation Paradise" folder found at various Forks' businesses.

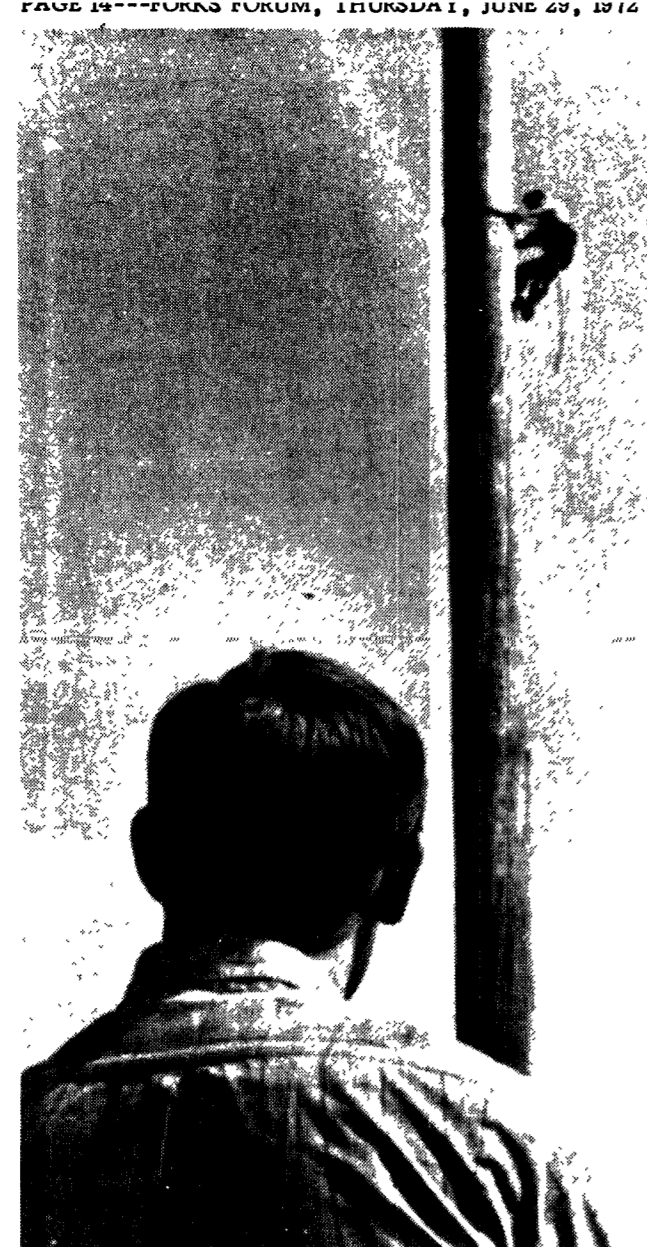

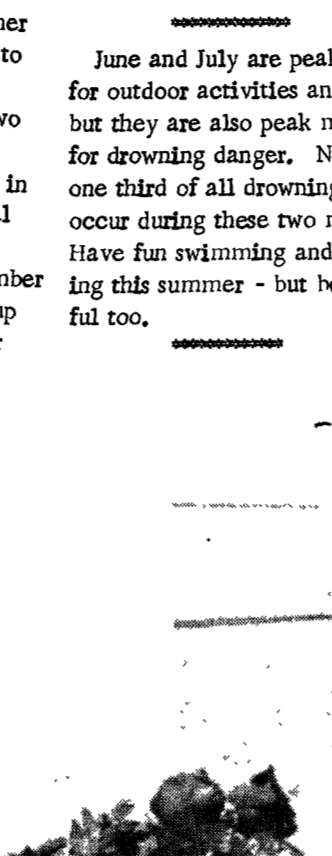
### Unemployment Insurance Schedule Change

Dan Shearer had been Justice of the Peace in Forks for 10 years at the time of his death in 1918. "Katie" was appointed to fill the office her husband left vacant. She became one of the five women in the State of Washington to occupy such a post at that time. She served as Justice of the Peace and Police Court Judge from 1922 through 1938, and it is from this period of her life that many fond memories stem.

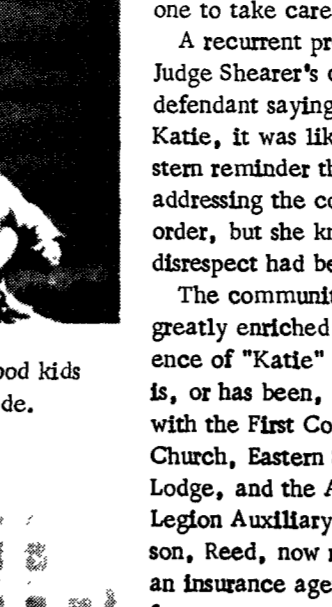

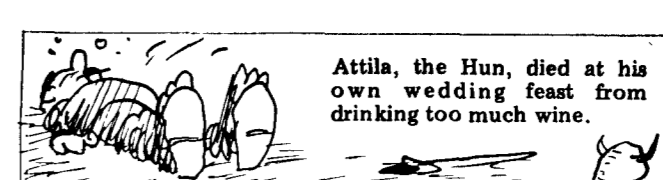

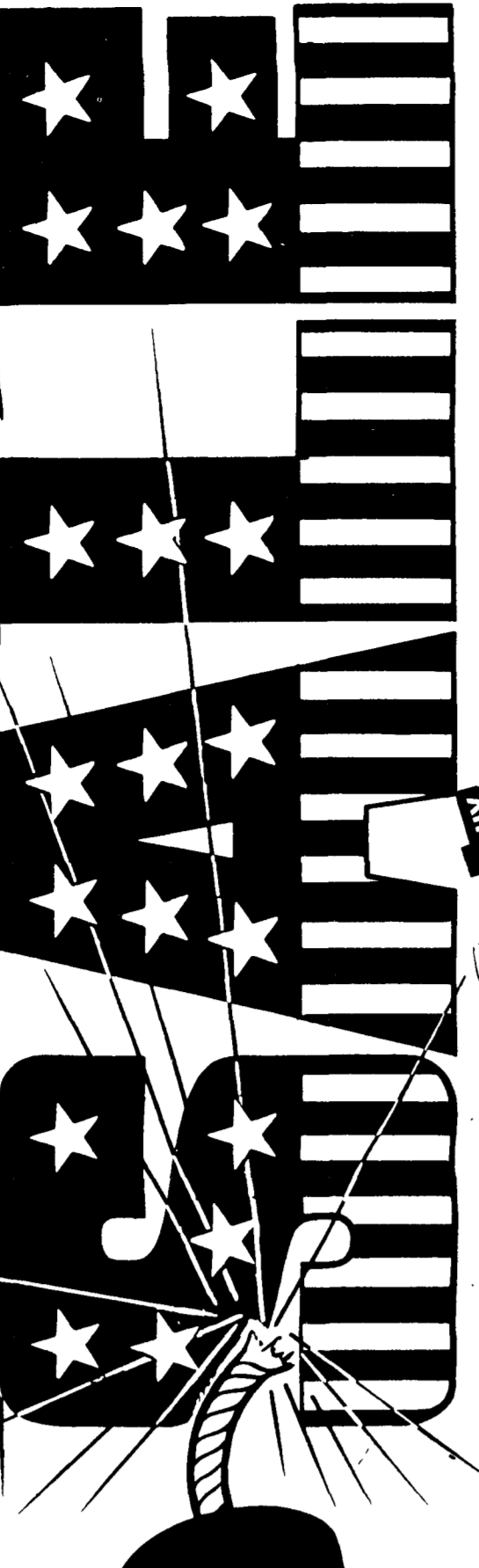
