TOWN COUNCIL

The Town Council met and the meeting convened exactly at 7:30 Monday evening, July 10, 1972. The Council approved the minutes of the previous meeting of June 26, 1972, and the warrants were also approved.
The business concerned construction of a well house to control house and well #4. Well #3 has been malfunctioning, and at one time during our good weather our water supply was down to 200,000 gallons, and if you wonder how low that is, call the water department; they will tell you that's down to hours. A motion was made to call for bids for the well house, control house, and the electrical. The motion carried.
The following building permits were approved by the council: George Baker, remodeling, \$3,500.00, D. N. Oulok Construction; Antler Restaurant, new front window, \$230,000; Olson and Miller Logging Co., new shop, \$10,000.00.
A report on the results of the sewer system protests were made public. The protest was 57, 1/2 percent, 1, 1/2 percent short of killing the system.

At the next regular council meeting of July 24 there will be a meeting of the minds with the Lee Johnson & Associates engineers and the financial heads of the bonding co.
Just in case you were not informed, our water has flouride, and the garbage dump is still open, which is good, because there isn't a litter barrel for miles. Our jail was inspected, and there are no drinking facilities in the north cell. The marshal will look into the cost of same.
Come to the next regular council meeting on July 24, 1972, and find out what's happening.

Supintendent Roger W. Elephant seals breed on offshore islands along the coast of California and Mexico. Yearlings and adults migrate to Oregon, Washington and British Columbia offshore waters during this part of the year.
Elephant seals are a rather sluggish animal, and during the summer undergo an annual moult, a time in which the fur may be sloughing off in large sheets.

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
