programs are costly, with high equipment investments and low student enrollment per class. For example, we recently purchased a testing device for the diesel mechanics shop which cost \$9,000, and that's just the basic unit. With all the necessary attachments, this single piece of equipment might come close to \$12,000.

Dr. Quast explained the importance of referendum 31 to the college. This referendum authorizes the state to issue and sell \$50-million in bonds for community college construction projects. If passed, referendum 31 will provide \$525,000 for Peninsula College construction.

Quast emphasized that the passage of this referendum will in no way increase any taxes. "We have the green light from the State Board

of Community College Education to use this money for the construction of a forestry technician and health science building (which will include space for registered and practical nurses' training programs) for the expansion of the library to make it a true learning resources center with audio-visual equipment and language laboratories; and for the enlargement of our dining facilities which have become overcrowded.

Les Wardwick, chairman of the "Friends of the College Committee", appointed Board of Trustees member Fred Rosmond, and former Trustee, Boyd Rupp, as "Special Chiefs" for the barbecue to be held Sunday, September 17, on the Peninsula College campus.

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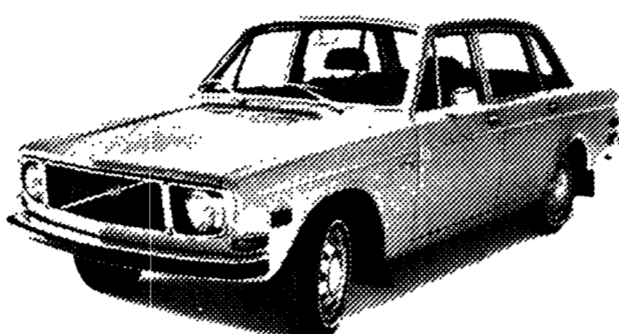

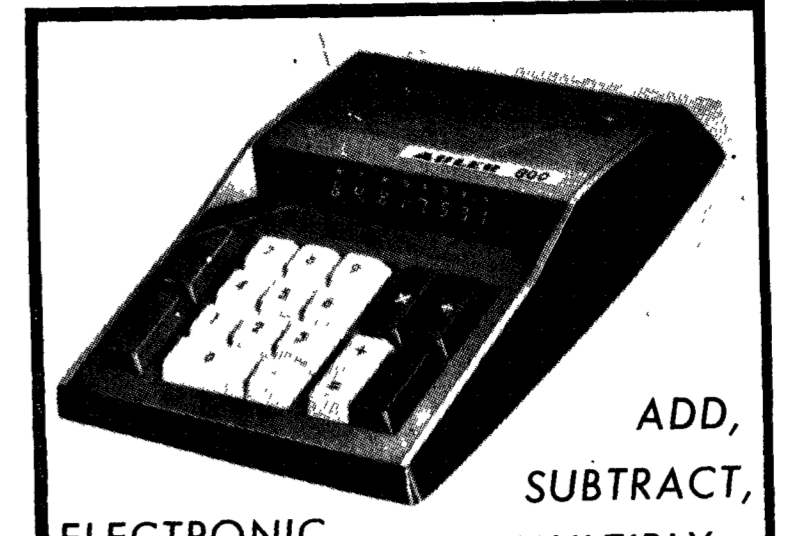
CULP VISITS FORKS






