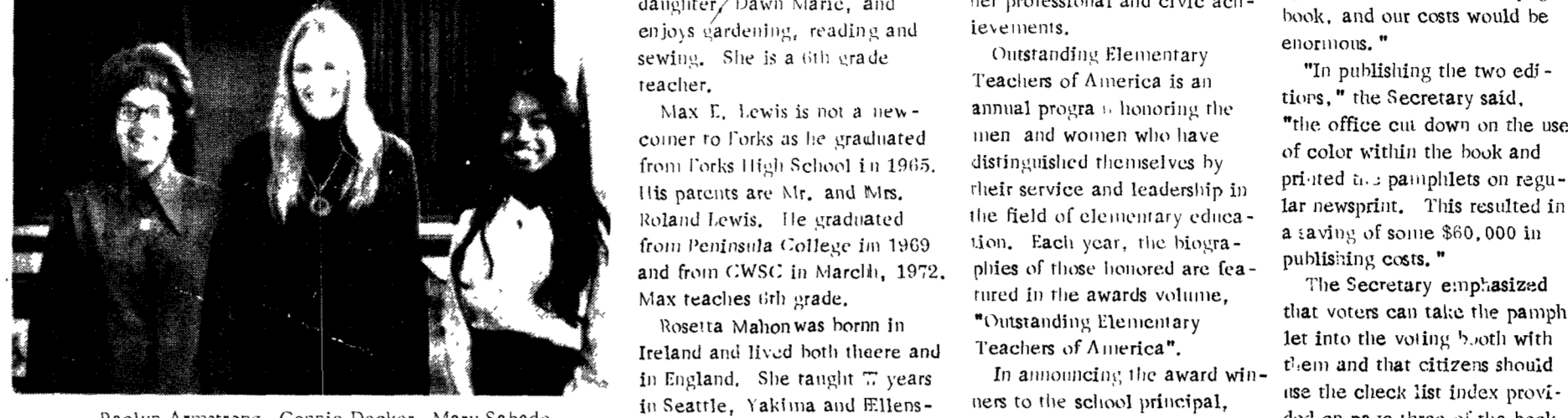

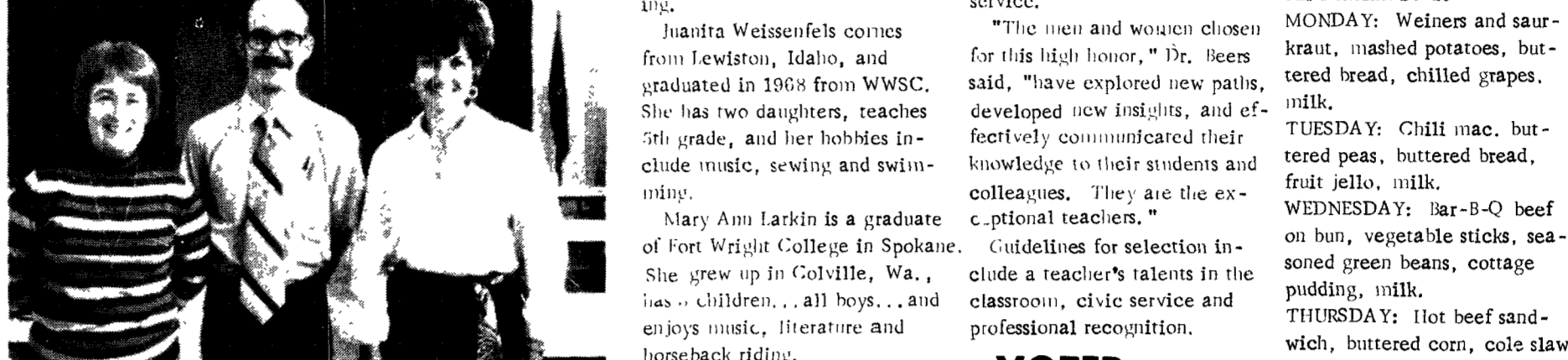

"an one this year." The edition released today relates to ballot issues only. The second edition, scheduled for release in mid-October, will deal with candidates only. "The general election ballot will be impossible to digest if voters are not informed before they enter the voting booth," the Secretary said. "Therefore, we published the two editions so citizens would not have to study too much material at one time."

The Secretary of State maintains that it would be very difficult to publish a single pamphlet as in previous years. "If we tried to put out just a single edition," he said, "the handy Voter Pamphlet of four years ago would become a 200 page book, and our costs would be enormous."

"In publishing the two editions," the Secretary said, "the office cut down on the use of color within the book and printed two pamphlets on regular weight. This resulted in a saving of some \$60,000 in publishing costs."

The Secretary emphasized that voters can also get the pamphlet into the voting booth with them and that citizens should use the election list Index provided on page three of the booklet.

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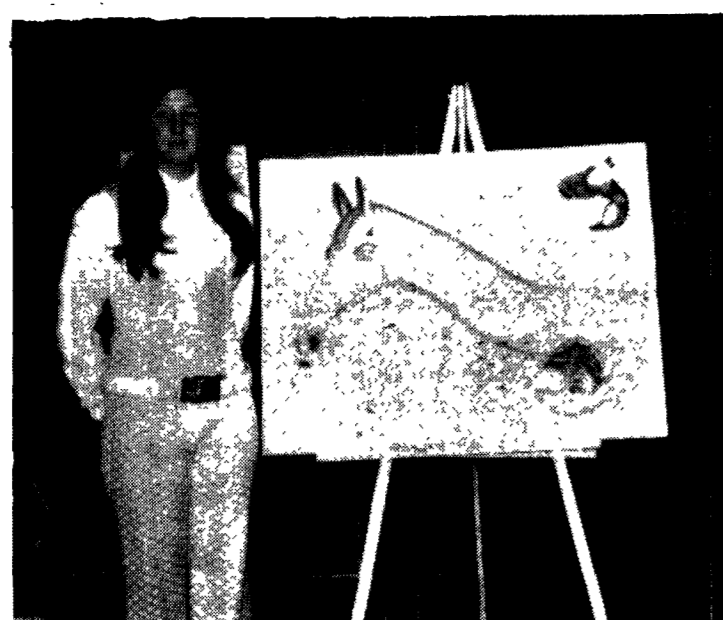

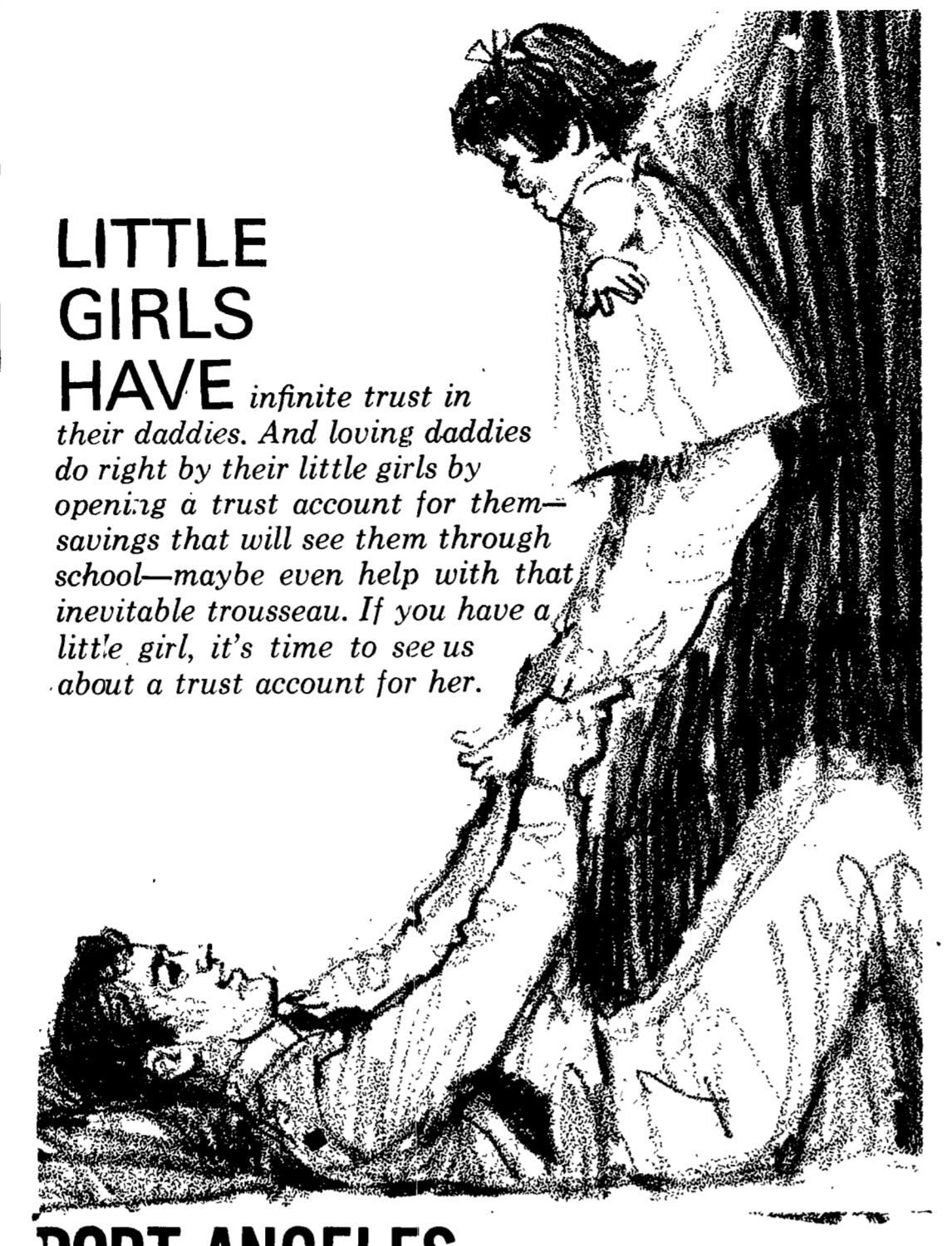

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
