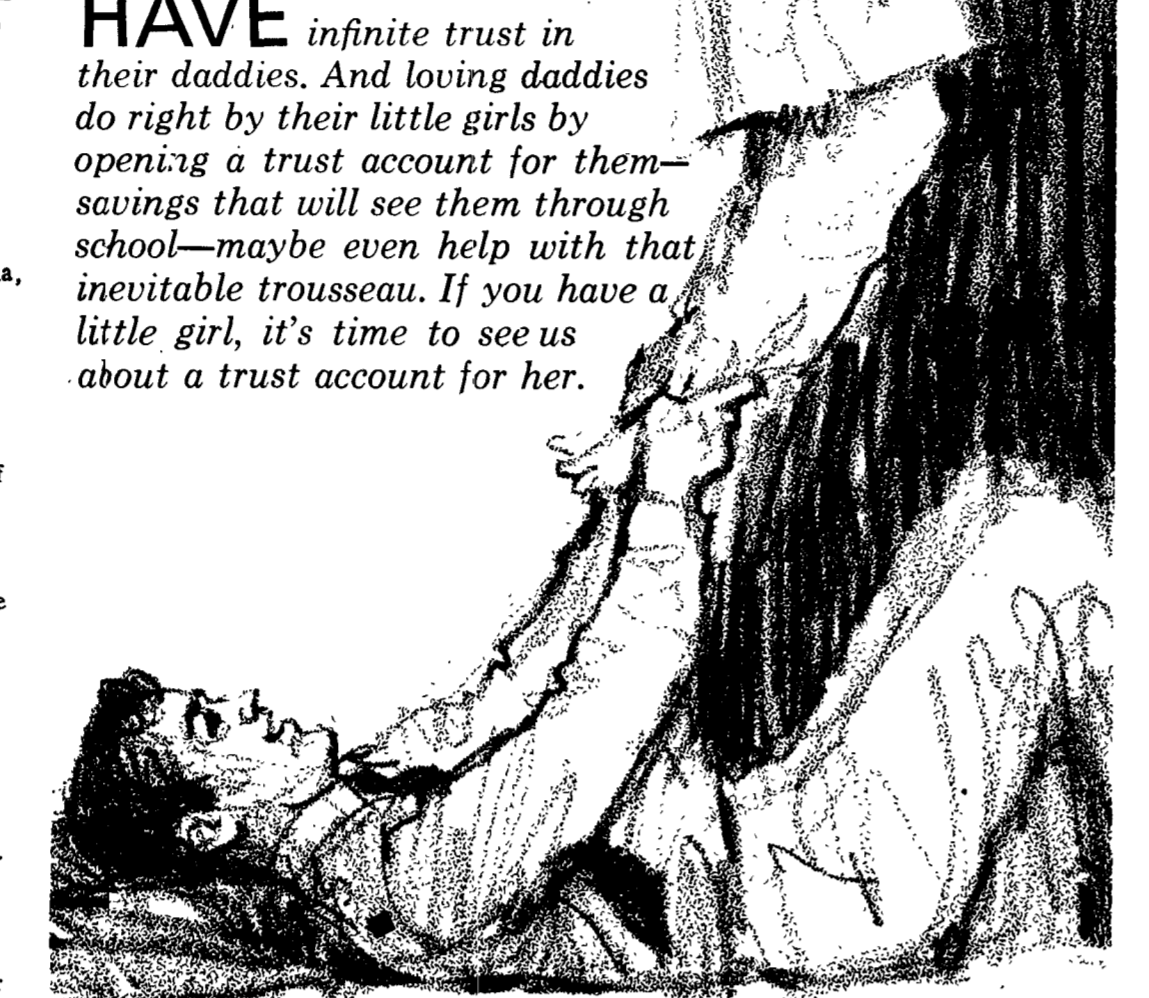

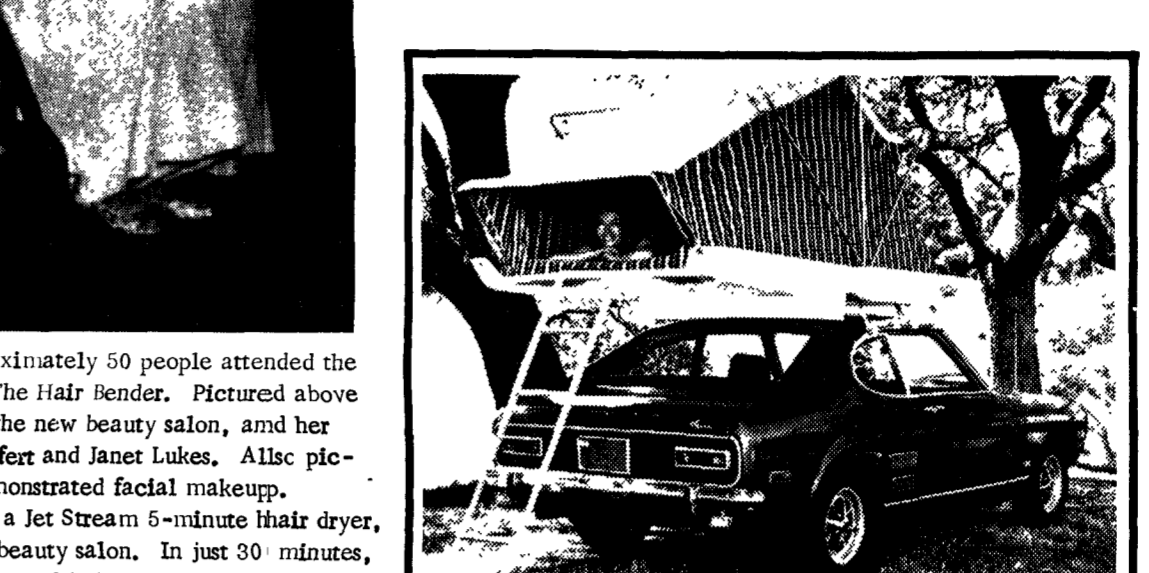

The setting was almost unbelievable for a high school football game. Last Thursday night, the Forks Spartans journeyed to Federal Way to encounter the Decatur Gatons.

The Gatons, known for size but hampered by little speed, showed the ability to rouse the ball against the aggressive Spartan defense.

Upon arriving in Federal Way, the Spartans took to the field in street clothes to get a close look at the astro-turf surface they were to play on for the first time.

The beautiful 34-acre turf, surrounded on both sides by covered grandstands and an excellent lighting system, had caused a matter of controversy in the Federal Way area. Just a month before the completion, a group of area residents had an injunction ordered to stop construction. The group was ordering the complete tear-down of the almost completed football and track complex.

The judge expedited the motion, and construction resumed and was completed. All the schools in the Federal Way area, Federal Way High School, Decatur, Tyson, and Jefferson use the field for their home football games.

Thursday morning heavy rains fell over western Washington, making the astro-turf very slippery, and it was figured that footing would be very poor.

Almost all pre-game philosophies were proven wrong as footing was not the issue in the game. In fact, there were only seven slips, indicating the drainage was sufficient to make the conditions bearable.

The encounter started with host Decatur holding off to the Spartans. The first series of plays were uneventful for Forks, and were forced to punt. Rick Chilton, punting for Forks, stood back on his 23 and waited for the snap from center. The ball was snapped from center, and was brought down on the Spartan

2 by punting defensive end Jon Nichols. As in previous games, mistakes such as this have hurt the Spartans. The defensive line for the Spartans rose up and made a good showing, stopping the Gatons twice from stepping the Gatons twice from the two. On third and goal with 6:45 remaining in the first quarter, quarterback Steve Mast pushed, showed and dove across for the score. The p.a.t. was wide, and Decatur led 6-0.

On the ensuing kickoff, Forks was able to put a drive together that would give them a game-winning lead for the first time this season.

With the ball marked on the Gatons' 46 yard line, Oles and Oles set up the Spartans' scoring drive. Ken Olson dropped back under good protection to his own 45 and saw Dave Olson outrun beam Olmstead, his nearest defender. Olson hit Oles on a picture-perfect pass at the 29, and Oles streaked the left side-line for the score. The score was tied 6-6 when Coach Hill sent in sophomore quarterback Jim Blair for the p.a.t. Blair rolled to his right, finding Craig Petrovich positioned in the end zone. Petrovich drew the pass in and the Spartans led 12-6.

The lead held most of the game for the Spartans. Both clubs had opportunities to score on mistakes made by each. Penalties hurt both teams on sustained drives. Forks had the biggest problem of all. On 2 snaps from center for punts, the ball sailed over Kip Chiklen's head, and once Chilton dropped the snap back. The defense was the key in the entire game once again for Forks, notably in the second half.

With an 8-0 lead most of the game, Forks had victory slip through their grasp at the 2:15 mark of the fourth period. A drive put together by Mast at quarterback, Mast went to Chilton, Menick, and Rob Porter to get the ball into the Forks zone. With a fourth and nine, Mast dropped back and found Chilton clear and rifled him a pass to the Spartan 6. The defense assembled a great effort, stopping the Gatons six or seven yards in the 5. On 4th and 1 1/2 yard to go, Mast pushed up the middle for the score. Their p.a.t. was good

and the Gatons led 14-0. After the kickoff, Olson, who had the offensive line fall many times during the evening, with the defense dropping him for Jones. Fred Petrovich, then Oles on passes. The pass to Oles was probably the most damaging for Forks during the progress of the evening. Oles, on the left and behind Olmstead, had the pass lead him about 2 yards. As the pass was coming within reach, Olmstead stopped, Oles ran into Olmstead, and a flag was dropped. Believe it or not, offensive pass interference was called against Oles. That stopped the drive for the Spartans, once again falling short at the end of the game. A person can only wonder what would have happened had a better call been made on the pass interference call against Oles.

After the game, Coach Hill stated the defense played well, but offensively, work was needed.

Decatur collected 11 first downs to the Spartans. A big play that should be brought up was that both teams were plagued with fumbles. The Spartans had 5, 3, 1, 1, 4, and the Gatons had 6, 1, 1, 4.

The Spartans next game will be a rematch against the Chinacum Cowboys. It will also mark the first league encounter of the season for the Spartans. Plan on holding on hard (2nd) sign it 8 p.m. and support a determined, energetic group of Spartans.

The next home game for the Spartans will be Oct. 6 against Bainbridge.
