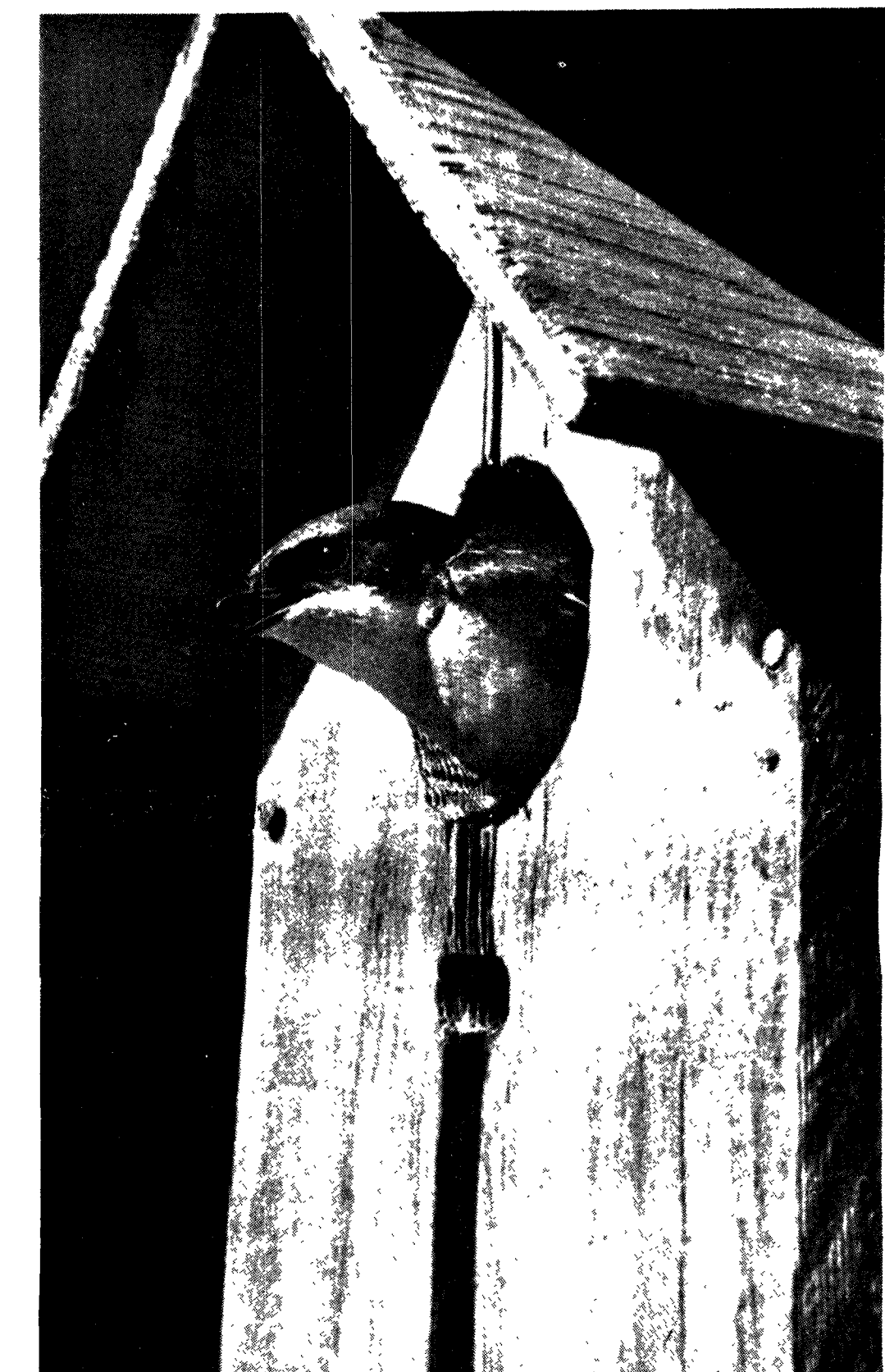

## CITY COUNCIL MINUTES

Bicycle safety was the foremost topic of conversation at Monday evening's (July 23rd) city council meeting. Fred Cline told of seeing young cyclists race up and down the sidewalks of Forks creating hazard for themselves as well as pedestrians. It was noted by Marshall Bryson that city ordinance number

4, section 1, prohibits anyone from riding a bicycle, motor bike or animal on the sidewalks of town. Although it has not been strictly enforced so far, hence forward cyclists on the sidewalk may be cited. The idea of bike stands in the downtown area was discussed. This, council members feel would alleviate the nuisance of bicycles parked at the front door at stores downtown as well as keeping bikes off the sidewalk.

Marshall Ken Bryson reported that \$2,000 worth of burglary goods has been recovered by the Forks police. Included in the property were 5 power saws and "a complementation of other things." According to Mayor Earl Kennedy the malfunction in well number 3 has been corrected and there is now plenty of water. Mayor Kennedy urged that citizens employ "common sense" when using water so that the good supply of water will not be wasted.

## FORKS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SUPPORTS SEWER PROJECT

The Forks Chamber of Commerce, being vitally interested in the welfare and orderly development of the Greater Forks Area, hereby goes on record as favoring the proposed Sewer Project. The Forks Chamber of Commerce believes the Sewer Project is a priority requirement, necessary to meet the rapid expansion we have had and will continue to experience in our community.  
Among those factors favoring the Sewer Project, we believe protection of the City's water supply to be most important. The City's water supply can not be allowed to be endangered by pollution from septic tank and drain field run-off. Public Health officials can not predict an exact time that our water supply will become polluted; however, they can tell us we are approaching a time when we should be concerned. We believe the time to act is NOW, not later. We would encourage all citizens affected by the Sewer Project to study the sewer proposal carefully before deciding whether they favor or oppose the proposal, always keeping in mind the welfare of the entire community.

Bill 276, the candidates financial reporting requirement, will affect any candidates running for office in this area. First filing date for open council positions is August 30th. Each candidate must file personal financial disclosure but due to the population of the area an election finance report is not mandatory but may be submitted by choice.  
Glen Ertelson has been granted a building permit to construct a \$26,000 duplex in the 3rd Mansfield addition.

## NEW WATERING SCHEDULE

The Forks Municipal Water Department has requested that people living on the east side of Highway 101 water lawns, gardens, etc. on even-numbered days of the month and those living on the west side of Highway 101 water on odd-numbered days until further notice, due to the low water supply.

Kate Shearer, longtime resident in the area, died July 14th in Forks. Mrs. Shearer was born in 1894 in Gold Hill, Oregon to the Thomas Pankeys. She spent her early years in Oregon until she married Daniel Shearer in 1914. Immediately after their marriage they came to Forks where Mr. Shearer was engaged in construction. Mrs. Shearer was farmstress during World War I and Justice of the Peace in the 1950's. She held membership in the Eastern Star and Rebekah Lodges, the Clallam County Park Board, Forks Cemetery Board and the Washington State Safety Council. She was active in the ladies aid to the Congregational Church and was instrumental in the beginnings of the Community Library. Services were held in the Congregational Church and interment was in the Forks Cemetery. Surviving are three brothers, Joseph Pankey of White City, Oregon; Earl Pankey of Jacksonville, Oregon and Theron Pankey of Phoenix, Oregon. Her two sons are Theron Reed Shearer and Ronald Shearer, both of Forks. The family requests that any remembrances be sent to the organization of the donor's choice.

**CHAMBER OF COMMERCE**

Sixteen persons attended Tuesday's Chamber of Commerce meeting in the Vagabond Dining Room. Argyle Campbell made his weekly report from Washington citing first the House Interior Committee's reconsideration of previous approval for the Alaskan Pipeline. Committee members feel that further environmental study on the project could be beneficial. Pension control has been granted Senate finance yet it is still undecided whether the pension plans will be regulated under the present tax code or if it would be a more effective program under a new bureaucracy. Finally, it is expected that a decision on the minimum wage base will be postponed for another few months. Some Senate members foresee a pocket veto by Mr. Nixon on the increase of minimum

wage at this time. Guests at the luncheon included Newson Baker, Tom Neal and Bob Edmondson of the Port of Port Angeles. The visitors presented a slide show highlighting the features of the Port Angeles and La Push area. It was noted that all citizens of Clallam County are welcome at Port Commissioners meetings. The meetings are held every 2nd Thursday at the Port of Port Angeles Building. A statement from the Chamber of Commerce supporting the proposed sewer project was read and approved by those attending. A copy of this letter will be published in the Forum this week.

You should request the "short form" when registering a water right claim if:

- (1) You use less than 5000 gallons of water each day, and
- (2) Your use of any water source is for:
  - (a) single or group domestic supply
  - (b) stock water
  - (c) watering a lawn or non-commercial garden 1/4 acre--or less

The "standard form" must still be used to register any claim for water use over 5000 gallons a day.

If you need help in preparing any of the claim forms or determining your need to register a claim, contact one of the Department of Ecology offices listed below. Your county extension agent also has registration forms and information concerning water right claims.

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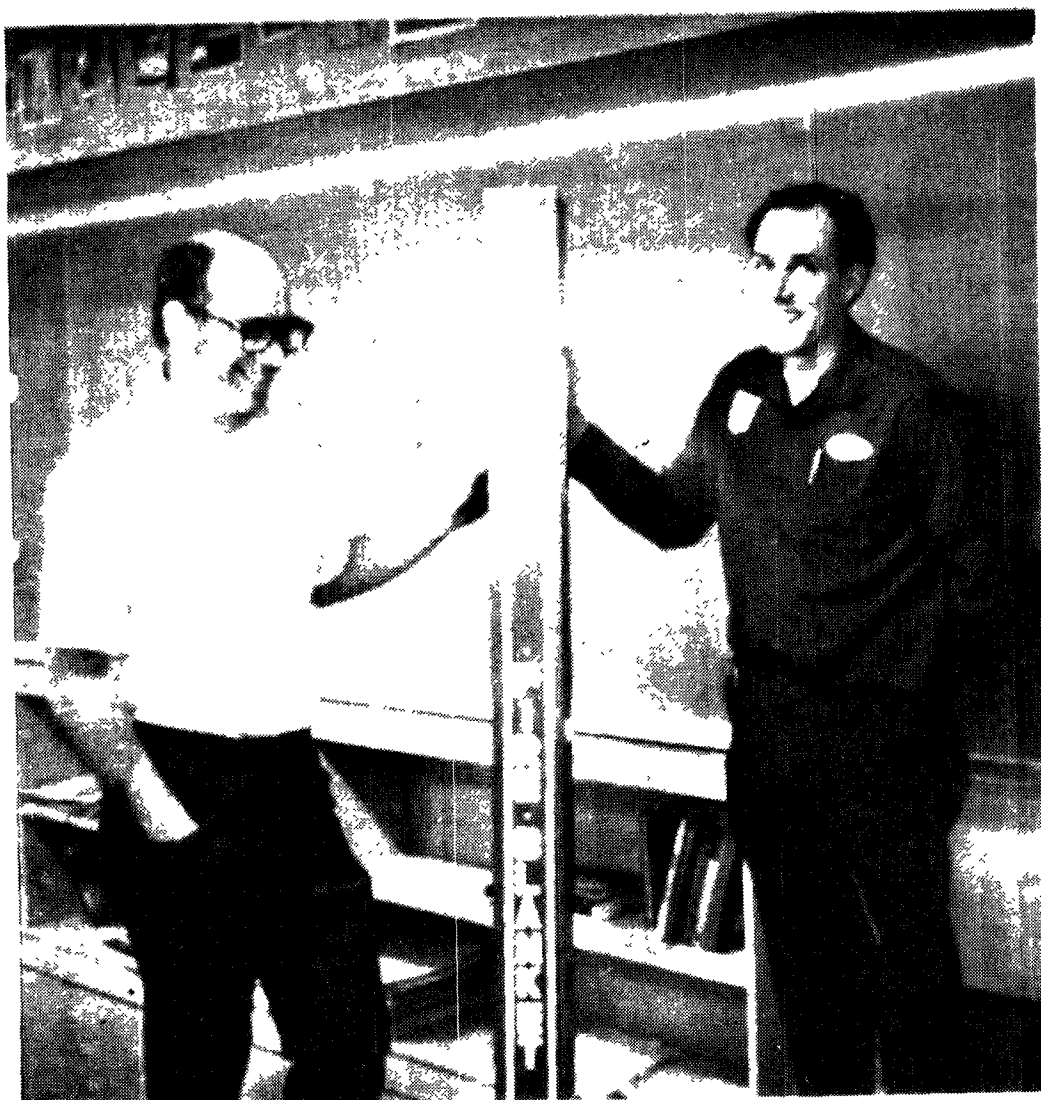

**Some people enjoy the gas shortage!**

In its fourth weekly survey of more than 150 gasoline stations in this state, the Automobile Club of Washington reports some improvement in the gas shortage over a week ago.

The 192,000 member organization also found that some station owners are beginning to enjoy the shortage.

Here's how the dealers look at it: They have been assured by the oil companies that they will get as much or nearly as much gasoline as they sold a year ago. Since then, the demand for gas has increased considerably. There are more cars on the road--there are more heavy recreation vehicles which use larger amounts of gas--and all new cars are equipped with anti-pollution devices which require at least 15% more gas in order to perform normally.

So the gas dealers know in advance that they will have a pretty good year,

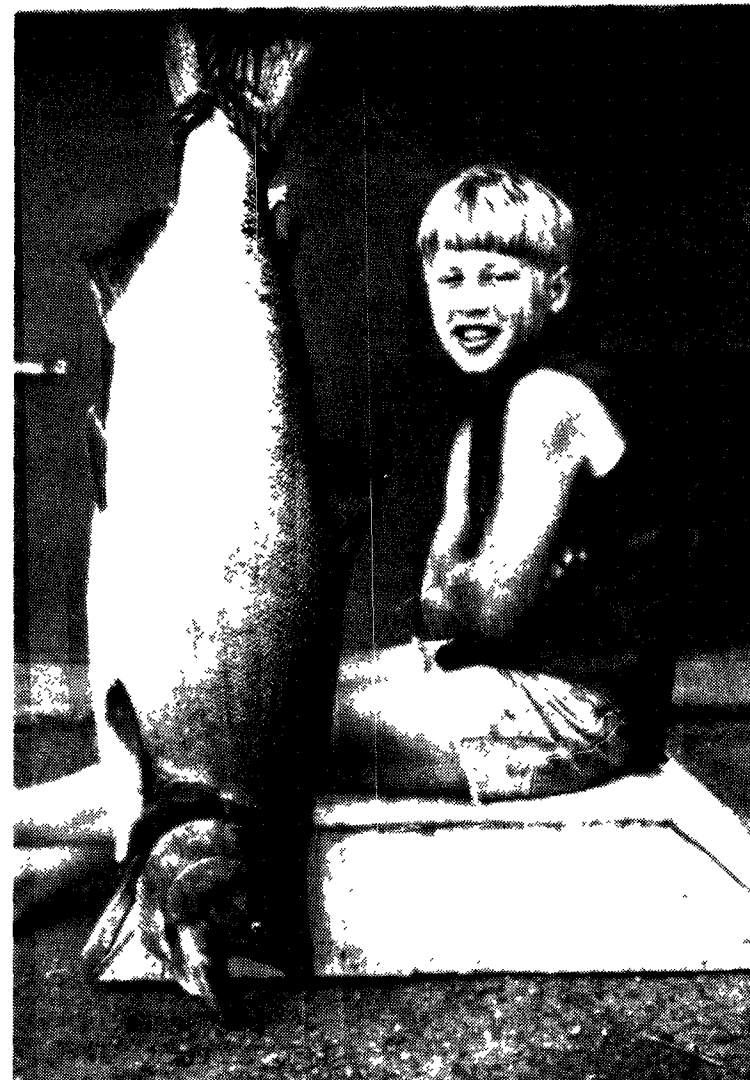
no matter how the gas gauge bounces.

Consequently, 53% of the stations polled are closed all day Sunday, and an increasing number are thinking about closing all day Saturday.

67% are closing earlier--before 9 p.m. every day. Some dealers expressed delight that they now can spend more time with their families. And some have increased their income considerably by reducing the number of employees--night and weekend workers.

The Auto Club is concerned about the inconvenience Sunday closures may have on the traveling public, especially out-of-state visitors. It also points to the seriousness of increasing unemployment by closing nights and Sundays.

But the motorist organization emphasized that there is plenty of gas at all major vacation and recreation areas--and there are plenty of rooms and camp sites available throughout the Northwest.

**Basic educational opportunity grants**

Students who need money for their education after high school may now apply for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, Congresswoman Julia Butler Hansen, D.-Wash., reported.

More than \$122 million is available under this new program being administered by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare's Office of Education.

Although limited this year to first-year, full-time postsecondary students, the program is expected to benefit an estimated one-half million students who might otherwise be unable to continue their education, Rep. Hansen explained.

"Along with other federal programs of student financial aid, it marks progress toward the ultimate goal of making postsecondary education available to all young people who desire it."

Under the Basic Grant program, students in financial need may obtain funds to help pay their educational expenses at any approved college, university, vocational school, technical institute, or hospital school of nursing. How much a student or his family can contribute affects the amount of his basic grant and is determined according to a formula established by the U.S. Office of Education.

To apply for a Basic Grant, an Application for Determination of Expected Family Contribution" must be obtained, filled out and mailed to P.O. Box 52240, Iowa City, Iowa 52240. Within a month the student is notified of the amount of his family's expected contribution. He then submits the notification to the school of his choice, which calculates the amount of the Basic Grant to which he is entitled.

Application forms are now available at student financial aid offices at postsecondary institutions, high school guidance offices, post offices, state employment offices, county agricultural extension services, and public schools. Inward

Bound, and Student Special Services projects. If unavailable in the area where the student resides, he can write to Box G, Iowa City, Iowa 52240. Other forms of federal student assistance such as Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants, College Work-Study, National Direct Student Loans, and Guaranteed Student Loans are available in addition to Basic Grants.

For further information on Basic Grants and other student financial aid programs, students should contact their high school counselor or the financial aid officer at the school in which they expect to enroll.

**Change In Social Security Law**

A recent change in the Social Security law provides that ex-servicemen receiving Social Security benefits may have their benefits recalculated to include gratuitous military service wage credits for active service after 1956, according to Tom Deeney, Social Security Branch manager in Port Angeles.

"Servicemen will receive wage credits of 300 dollars for each calendar quarter that they were in active service after 1956," Deeney said. "In many cases the additional credits will result in a higher Social Security benefit." There is no requirement for length of service. One day of active duty or active duty for training will en-

title the serviceman to the wage credit for that calendar quarter. Deeney pointed out that free military service wage credits cannot be granted automatically. "In order to have his benefit recalculated the serviceman must file an application with the Social Security Administration and submit evidence of his active military service after 1956 if it is available."

Deeney suggested that any ex-serviceman who is now receiving a Social Security benefit and who had active duty in the uniformed services after 1956 should contact the local Social Security Office at 107 E. 8th Street or call 487-1167 for information.

## RECREATIONAL DEVELOPEMENTS BY DNR IN TROUBLE

"Outdoor recreation development by the Department of Natural Resources in Washington is in serious trouble," says Bert Cole, Commissioner of Public Lands. The DNR, which has already built more than 180 outdoor recreational camps and picnic areas in the state, has been forced to halt plans on two recreation projects on Whidbey Island and San Juan Island, and several others are threatened.

DNR has been denied shoreline management permits by the respective County Commissioners. The permits have been denied because of objections from neighboring landowners. One of the developments is at Useless Bay, on the west side of Whidbey Island. Land has been purchased, plans made, and money appropriated to construct outdoor recreation facilities and to develop an access route to 235 acres of publicly-owned tidelands. The denial of a shoreline management construction permit by Island County Commissioners means this beach will remain unavailable to the public.

The other project is at Carle Point on the south end of San Juan Island; it has been denied a permit by the San Juan County Commissioners. This site would have provided public recreation access to over two miles of beach. Other DNR projects that are threatened include Center Island Boster's camp, a proposed destination camp for boaters that would be located just east of Lopez Island. The camp would serve as a base from which recreationists could reach hundreds of miles of publicly-owned tidelands by boat. This project will be before the San Juan County Commissioners for approval next year.

The public's interest in developing outdoor recreation sites was clearly expressed last November, when voters approved Referendum 28 and authorized \$40,000,000 for such recreation projects. Private landowners adjacent to the sites, however, insist

that public access would ruin the pastoral, residential nature of their land, and would increase vandalism, fires and trespassing on private property.

Commissioner Cole stated "Access to the outstanding recreational resources of Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands must not be limited to a privileged few, as has happened on comparable areas in many other states." He suggested that Washington's outdoor recreationists, sportsmen, and boaters write to the County Commissioners of Island and San Juan Counties and their local County Commissioners expressing their desire to enjoy these public lands that are now unavailable for their use.

Usually when boaters need help, they call the Coast Guard; but this summer, in at least one

instance, the roles will be reversed. The Coast Guard hopes to incorporate results of the study into reports and suggestions for improving small-boat design standards. "In the past five years, more fatalities have resulted from capsizing than from any other type of small boat casualty," reports Chief of the Coast Guard's Northwest Boating Safety

Branch, Lieutenant Commander A. B. Ford. "We'd like to find out just how much influence, if any, boat design has had on these statistics." The Coast Guard is interested in hearing about any case of swamping or capsizing involving a recreational boat of 20 feet in length or less (excluding sailboats, canoes, and kayaks) no matter how insignificant it might seem. The Coast Guard is asking, however, that the boat be available for measurement and that at least one boat occupant be available for interviewing.
