Fire danger may force land closure

"Due to the extremely critical fire hazard condition throughout the Pacific Northwest it may be necessary to close forested areas east of the Cascade crest in Washington to public entry," Commissioner of Public Lands Bert L. Cole announced today. Cole said that he and Paul Kraus, Supervisor of the Department of Natural Resources Fire Control Division are evaluating the situation daily in conjunction with the U.S. Forest Service.

If the action is taken it would close the dove and pigeon hunting season that normally begins September 1st. The closure would mean that motoring, hiking, horse-back riding, or any other form of travel on forest roads and trails, including cross country travel, would not be permitted. Camping, fishing, berry picking, etc., would also be prohibited if travel over forest roads, trails, or cross country is required. Boaters would be required to confine their access to shores with improved campgrounds or areas free of combustible material. Recreationalists would still be able to use state parks or designated campgrounds, as long as travel to the area was over country roads or state highways.

Cole said that if moisture conditions improve and the fire danger lessens, the action will not be taken. There are no major fires presently burning in Washington, but Idaho, Oregon and Montana are battling serious fires and the danger potential in Washington is very high.

The last time such a closure was in effect was in 1970. Cole

RESOLUTION No. 54

A RESOLUTION of the Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, declaring the intention of the Town Council to improve a certain area by the construction and installation of a sanitary sewer system there-in, and by doing all work necessary in connection therewith, and fixing a time, date and place for a hearing on this resolution of intention.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, to order the improvement of the area bounded as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, and by the acquisition, construction and installation of a sanitary sewer system within such area as set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, and by the construction of the Town of Forks sewage treatment plant, as described in Exhibit "C", attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, and by the acquisition, construction and installation of the town sewer stem described in Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.

Such improvements shall be installed complete with all manholes, stub sewers and other equipment and appurtenances including pumping stations necessary to the proper operation of said sewer system all as more fully described in the preliminary plans therefor, prepared by Lee Johnson and Assoc., Inc. consulting engineers of Everett, Washington, and now on file with the Town.

The Town shall acquire by purchase, franchise, lease or condemnation all property both real and personal or any interest therein and all rights of way, franchises, permits and easements which may be found necessary to acquire, construct and install the above-described improvements.

It is hereby further provided that the hereinbefore authorized plans of improvement shall be subject to such changes as to details of pipe size and location or any other details of said plans not affecting the service to be provided by the main general plan as shall be authorized by the Town Council either prior to or during the actual course of construction.

It is the intention of the City Council to form a utility local improvement district within the area bounded as set forth above.

Section 2. It is the intention of the Town Council that assessments shall be made against the property within the above-described boundaries in accordance with the special benefits derived by virtue of the aforesaid improvement.

Section 3. The Town's consulting engineers, Lee Johnson and Assoc., Inc. Everett, Washington, are hereby directed to submit to the Council at or prior to the date fixed for the hearing on this resolution a statement of the estimated cost and expense of such improvements, the portion of such cost to be borne by the property within the proposed improvement district, the local improvement district assessments outstanding and unpaid against the property therein, and the aggregate actual valuation of the improvements in the proposed district according to the situation last placed upon it for the purposes of general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts, parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited by said improvements, and the estimated amount of the cost and expense thereof to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land other property within the proposed improvement district.

Section 4. It is proposed that the limited costs of said improvements of \$278,836 shall be assessed against the property specially benefited thereby. Such assessments shall be for the sole

WATER RIGHT CLAIM "SHORT FORM" AVAILABLE

The 1973 Legislature amended the 1967 Water Right Claims Registration Act (Chapter 90.14 RCW) authorizing a simplified registration form (short form) which can be used by certain water users.

You should request the "short form" when registering a water right claim if:

- You use less than 5000 gallons of water each day, and
- Your use of any water source is for:
 - single or group domestic supply
 - stock water
 - watering a lawn or non-commercial garden 1/4 acre-or-less

The "standard form" must still be used to register any claim for water use over 5000 gallons a day.

If you need help in preparing any of the claim forms or determining your need to register a claim, contact one of the Department of Ecology offices listed below. Your county extension agent also has registration forms and information concerning water right claims.

LET 'EM EAT WOOD

What's a poor steer to eat when feedlots can't afford the price of grain?

"Let 'em eat wood."

That's the proposal of Dr. Irvin Dyer, a Washington State University animal nutritionist, who has demonstrated that wood and paper can be substituted for grain as the major source of carbohydrates for cattle and sheep.

Wood products converted into livestock feed can compare with high-cost grain, Dyer said. With barley prices currently about \$120 a ton, Dyer believes wood products are on the threshold of becoming a major new feed source.

Just how close is commercial adoption of the idea? Just last May a Mt. Vernon company began manufacturing a grain replacement in what apparently is the first such commercial operation in the United States.

Herb Kalbfleisch, vice president and manager of New Century Agriculture Inc., said the product is being marketed in Washington, Oregon, Idaho and Canada for \$34 a ton, at plant.

The product is made from cellulose in tallings from pulp mills, which brings up another point. If the practice catches on it could be a big step towards solving some pollution problems.

Residue tallings from pulp mills, forest slash (limbs, branches and small trees which aren't big enough to be of value to lumber companies) and other forest waste products, including waste paper could be converted into livestock feed.

"In order to produce beef as inexpensively as possible, we have no alternative but to go to a cheaper source of feed (than grain)," Dyer says.

He believes that grain will never again become an economical livestock feed unless the federal government bans grain exports. "As long as we market world-wide . . . we will likely always have a grain deficiency."

Fortunately, the world-wide grain shortage is developing on the heels of research which already points the way to a potential new livestock feed which is available in enormous quantities and which apparently can be economically converted into feed.

Dyer has been researching converting cellulose-containing, low-grade agricultural wastes into livestock feed since 1955 when he

joined the WSU Agricultural Research Center.

It was apparent to him even then that the world would run short of grain. His research initially was conducted on the cellulose in wheat straw, and he found that it could be a good source of livestock feed. But straw has to be gathered from vast areas to accumulate enough tonnage to make processing economical.

Thus far it hasn't been economically feasible to tap this source of cellulose for fattening cattle. However, about four years ago Dyer and the Weyerhaeuser Company independently became interested in the possibility of utilizing the cellulose in wood as a livestock feed. In June, 1969, Weyerhaeuser contracted with WSU for research on the subject.

Weyerhaeuser provides the wood products and \$15,000 a year. WSU provides the livestock, facilities, scientists and other overhead.

Dyer said the amount of cooking which that requires is not economical.

Research indicates the ratios in which wood and paper replace grain produce about 80 percent as fast a daily rate of gain in cattle and sheep as do conventional rations which utilize grain as a high-energy source.

Dyer said if the animals are carried longer on wood than animals on grain rations they will finish out about the same. If slaughtered after the same number of days on feed, the wood-fed animals would grade slightly lower because they have less body fat.

RESOLUTION NO. 53

A RESOLUTION of the Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, declaring the intention of the Town Council to improve a certain area by the construction and installation of a sanitary sewer system thereon, and by doing all work necessary in connection therewith, and fixing a time, date and place for a hearing on this resolution of intention.

BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, as follows:

Section 1. It is the intention of the Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, to order the improvement of the tract bounded as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, by the acquisition, construction and installation of a sanitary sewer system within such area as set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, by the construction of the Town of Forks sewage treatment plant, as described in Exhibit "C", attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, and by the acquisition, construction and installation of Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.

Such improvements shall be installed complete with all manholes, stub sewers and other equipment and appurtenances including pumping stations necessary to the proper operation of said sewer system all as more fully described in the preliminary plans thereof, prepared by Lee Johnson and Assoc., Inc. consulting engineers of Everett, Washington, and now on file with the Town.

The Town shall acquire by purchase, franchise, lease or condemnation all property both real and personal or any interest therein and all rights of way, franchises, permits and easements which may be found necessary to acquire, construct and install any above-described improvements.

It is hereby further provided that the hereinbefore authorized plans of improvement shall be subject to such changes as to details of pipe size and location or any other details of said plans not affecting the service to be provided by the main general plan as shall be authorized by the Town Council either prior to or during the actual course of construction.

It is the intention of the City Council to form a utility local improvement district within the area bounded as set forth above.

Section 2. It is the intention of the Town Council that assessments shall be made against the property within the above-described boundaries in accordance with the special benefits derived by virtue of the aforesaid improvements.

Section 3. The Town's consulting engineers, Lee Johnson and Assoc., Inc., Everett, Washington, are hereby directed to submit to the Council at or prior to the date fixed for the hearing on this resolution a statement of the estimated cost and expense of such improvements, the portion of such cost to be borne by the property within the proposed improvement district, the local improvement district assessments outstanding and unpaid against the property therein, and the aggregate actual valuation of the improvements in the proposed district according to the valuation last placed upon it for the purposes of general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing thereon the lots, tracts, parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited by said improvements, and the estimated amount of the cost and expense thereof to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land or other property within the proposed improvement district.

Section 4. It is proposed that not to exceed 60% of the total estimated costs of said improvements of \$50,088 shall be assessed against the property specially benefited thereby. Such assessments shall be for the sole use of payment into such revenue fund as may hereafter be specified by the Town Council for the payment of revenue bonds to be issued to defray the cost of the acquisition, construction and installation of the aforesaid improvements.

Section 5. All persons who may desire to object to the formation of such utility local improvement district are hereby notified to appear and present such objections at a meeting of the Town Council to be held at All-Purpose Room of Elementary School, Forks, Washington, at 7:30 p. m. on the 11th day of Sept., 1973.

which time and place are hereby fixed for hearing of matters relating to said proposed improvements and all objections thereto, and for determining the method of paying for said improvements.

The Town Clerk and the consulting engineers of the Town are hereby directed to prepare and give notice of such hearing in the manner required by law.

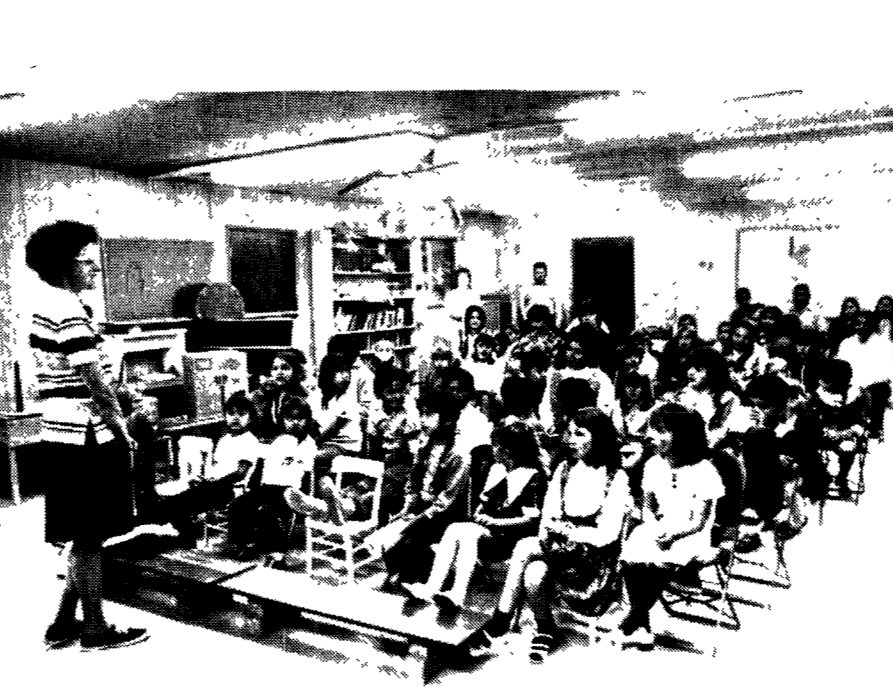

Smoke only in safe places and put your cigarette, cigar or pipe heel completely out every time you smoke. Use approved portable cooling units instead of open fires and charcoal burners.

Report any fires to the nearest forest ranger. If this is not possible, report to the telephone operator and she will put you in touch with the proper party. During this critical period until the fall rains come, we need to protect our natural resources and environment from man-caused wildfire. Help us Keep Washington Green.

In the world of crime they're called "paper hangers." But as many businessmen and retailers have found out, bad check artists can do a good job of recoloring ledger books in red ink as well. Exact losses are hard to pin down, but one source estimates that in the United States more than a billion dollars worth of goods, services and cash was stolen last year through the use of "rubber" checks.

is cashed, and that it be endorsed in front of the clerk handling it who also must then initial it. When such requirements are met the merchant is covered for losses up to \$50 per check. Losses up to \$200 per check are covered if the check is from a government agency or established business organization within 75 miles of the merchant's place of business.

This allows a merchant to cash payroll checks as a courtesy to customers and pick up added pay-day business. Postal money orders and express money orders are also covered up to the \$200 limit.

The economy is depending less and less on cash, notes the Institute, and as long as checks are used, the forgery problem will exist.

ONF adds land use planner

Charting the course of future land use for the 650,000-acre Olympic National Forest has been given additional emphasis by the addition of Randy Sheffield to the Staff of Forest Supervisor Maulic. Sheffield, a 1961 graduate of Iowa State in Landscape Architecture, will have responsibility for land use planning. Maulic states, "Sheffield's experience in Southern California plus his prior Forest Service assignments in the Denver and Portland Regional Offices of the Forest Service qualifies him well to head up this complex and often controversial planning effort. While in the Portland Office he served on the Regional Land Use Planning Council."
