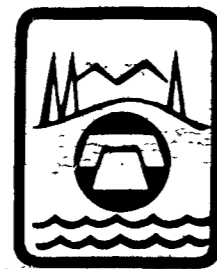

DRUNKS REDEFINED

Depending on behavior, intoxicated persons in the West End will be treated differently at the first of the year.

Instead of the frequent "blow in public" charge and a night of "drying out" in local jail cells, the person will have a choice of going home or to a detoxification center if he is cooperative. If not, he will be referred to a facility at the Forks Hospital.

The new procedure came about with the further prohibition of drinks at being sick people instead of criminals. Self-proclaimed "sick people" could still be taken on jail on a disorderly conduct charge.

FOREST STUMPAGE VALUES--

Stumpage values for old growth Douglas fir and hemlock in Western Washington will be 18 percent higher in 1975 under revised excise tax schedule adopted today by the Department of Revenue. Harvesters were granted more liberal adjustments for small-unit operations.

The average prices on which the tax will be computed on private timber harvested in the five stumpage zones west of the Cascades will be \$21 per thousand board feet for Douglas fir and \$15 for hemlock. Old growth red cedar prices will average \$16.10, an increase of 34 percent.

Old growth timber accounted for 67.3 percent of the 1975 taxable stumpage in Western Washington. Stumpage values for young growth Douglas fir will average \$121 per thousand, 27 percent higher than this year; hemlock \$120/MBF up 48 percent, and red cedar \$111/MBF, 18 per cent more than in 1974.

Young growth accounted for 29.1 percent of the Western Washington harvest on privately-owned timber lands in 1975.

Timings of Douglas fir in Western Washington will average \$89/MBF up 17 percent, and hemlock \$79/MBF up 27 percent. Timings accounted for 3.6 percent of the 1975 statewide harvest.

In Eastern Washington the average price of the dominant species, Ponderosa pine, will be \$90/MBF, 18 percent higher.

Eastern Washington private timber production of all species in 1975 amounted to 6.9 percent of the statewide harvest in volume and 2.8 percent in value.

Harvesters who have been limited to 250,000 board feet annually in order to qualify for a small-unit deduction, now may log as much as four times that amount annually without being taxed at full stumpage prices. Deductions will be increased to \$20/MBF for those harvesting units of 25,000 board feet or less each quarter and \$15/MBF for harvesters cutting units of 25,000 to 250,000 board feet quarterly. The current maximum adjustment is \$15/MBF.

The tax rate will remain 6.5 percent of adjusted stumpage value.

In a rematch of two teams that never say die when pitted against one another on the basketball floor, the Forks Spartans subdued the Bruins of Clallam Bay 59-48.

The Spartans kept hitting to their lead throughout the first three quarters and were leading on several occasions by as much as 20 points.

The Forks Spartans, posting their second win with one loss, manhandled the Bruins with relative ease. The Bruins now have a 1-3 season record.

The Bruins, to this point in the young '74-'75 season, have lost all three of their games to "A" schools.

Meanwhile, Coach Baholin of Forks figures that Forks could easily be 3-0 instead of 2-1. The offsetting left a lot to be desired in Raymond last Friday, and Coach Baholin figures things could have been much different with a game called with "non-home" officials.

The Spartans opened their attack quickly against the Bruins, jumping to a 21-16 first quarter lead.

The pace was set for the Spartans early as Forks cleaned the boards

well, allowing the Spartans two and sometimes three attempts at the basket.

The Bruins made several surges trying to break down the Spartan lead, only to have Forks regroup and pull back into their game pattern.

The Bruins slipped into a zone defense in the second half and allowed several outlet baskets, closing the gap to 9 points, 41-32. That came late in the 3rd quarter, and the Spartans put on a surge with the time remaining and popped to a 40-33 lead at the 3rd quarter break.

With the momentum going to the side of the Forks Spartans, substitutions were sent in freely as both teams relaxed and made one very friendly evening out of one truly competitive series.

The Spartans meet Sequim Friday night at Spartan gym in Forks, and travel to Montesano Saturday night. Both games will be aired on KVAC, with Spartan pre-game at 7:40, and Spartan basketball at 7:55.
