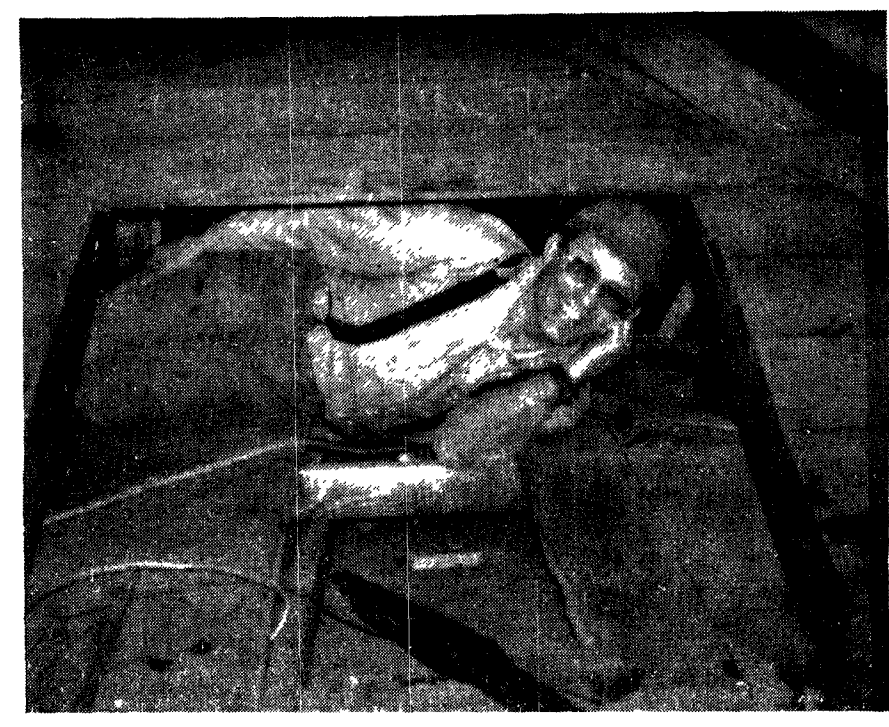
On the road with the Freeholders Forks May 18 CB May 25

The meeting this Wednesday (after presstime) has been called at Chairman Bruce Thomas' home for all interested parties.

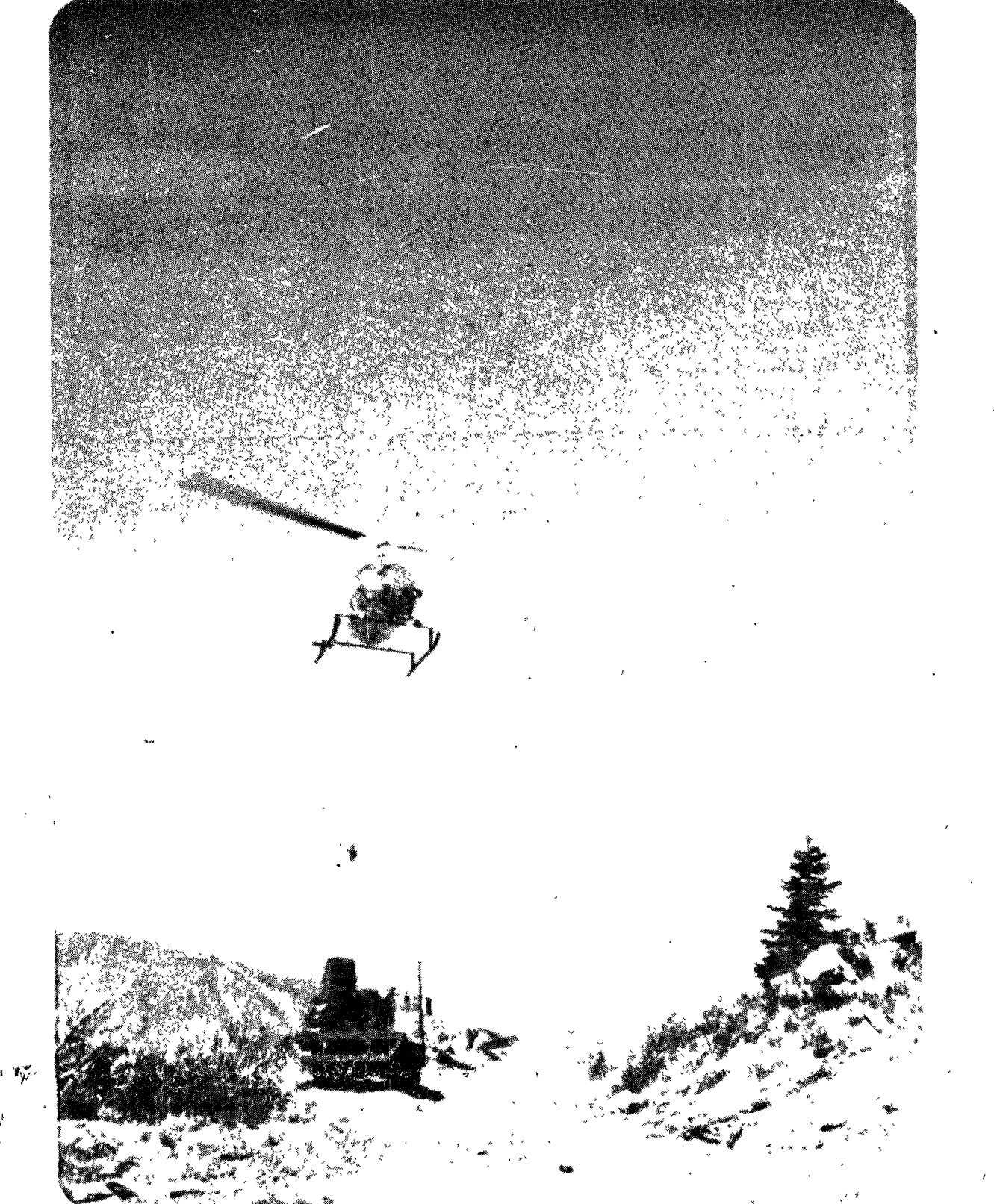
A little warmer-a little cooler

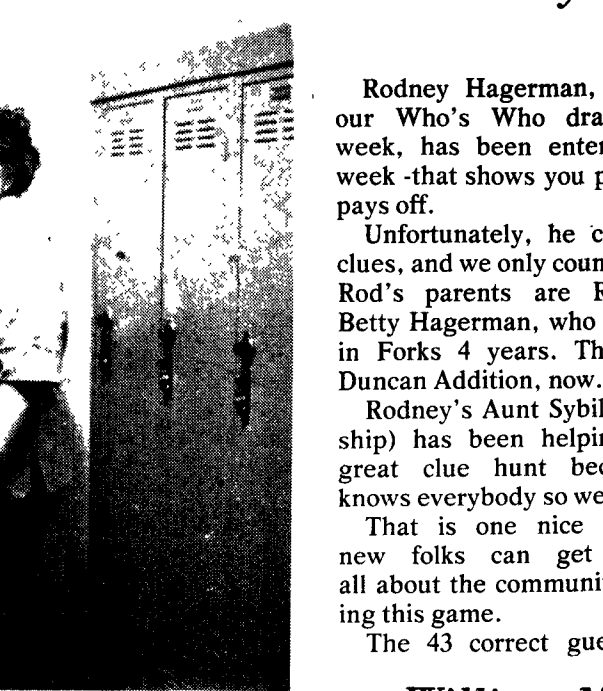
