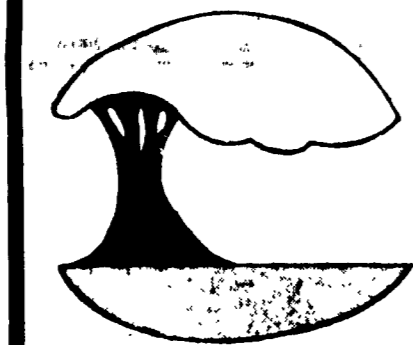

Seasons announced for local state game

General buck deer and pheasant season will begin on Oct. 16 and the Bull Elk season is slated to start November 1. Forest grouse will open September 11 and continue to November 14 statewide, with the late grouse season in certain townlands in Western Washington to run December 18 to 31. The very popular early chukar season in Southeast Washington and portions of Kittitas and Chelan counties will run from September 18 to October 15.

The Mountain Goat permit season is from Sept. 11 to Oct. 31 and the Mountain Sheep season Sept. 18 to Oct. 1. Both these hunts are by permit drawing only.

Hunters can expect a slightly longer deer and elk season this year. Prior to the general opening for Bull Elk, an antlerless-only elk season was approved in the Colocum Wildlife Recreation Area. This early season hopefully will keep elk from crossing the
