## School board meeting has large turnout

In a packed, tense atmosphere of this week's open school board Tuesday night at Forks, Chairman Larry Klahn truly showed his leadership ability in the handling of explosive issues at hand. His first action was to change the agenda to allow those present to have a place on the agenda, before any other business was conducted.

Although his original rule was to require each speaker to sign a roster before speaking, the crowd soon proved that it, too, could conduct itself correctly to allow a complete discussion of what had only been minor before the firing of Primary and Intermediate Principal Joe Newby.

Frank Williams brought the matter out in the open with his first sentence, "Mr. Chairman," he said addressing Mr. Klahn, "about Joe Newby, what is happening and exactly what is going on?"

Mr. Klahn did not answer. Wayne King stood before the packed room and said "I'm here in support of Joe Newby. Last year we had three principals, last year one retired, and it was somebody's decision to give the extra job to Joe Newby."

"He was required to evaluate 32 teachers once per month that is 288 evaluations in a (school) year. During the last 2 months, he was also required to evaluate cooks, janitors, and teachers totaling 47 persons. He also had to handle discipline, complaints, or comments from parents, duty rosters, and act as mediator between teachers and administration."

"I would like to say, I think the administration and board have taken advantage of this man."

Mr. Knutson answered by saying, "I don't know how many have applied, even as far away as Idaho. He at no time mentioned what publication the vacancy had been listed in, nor did he name any specific educational facility except Idaho."

Shirley Ringsmuth reported that 15 to 17 applications are in, and will be screened soon.

Someone asked why Mr. Newbery's alleged error wasn't repaired by his superior - shouldn't his superior (Mr. Knutson) also be held?

When questions were asked of board by Mike Henneke and a staff reporter about procedures in consulting with the School Board attorney, the members could not agree on whether they personally had ever discussed the Newby problem with their attorney privately. Some members thought that the Supt had always been present during the meetings; others, not so sure, and earlier they had told the audience that they had received their legal advice from Mr. Knutson, who had gotten it from the attorney. The attorney was not present to clarify just who did get advice.

Again and again Mr. Maxfield tried to get the school board "to get to the root of the real problem" but got no concrete answer.

Jess said, "Larry, it looks like now...related the Newby problem...but there is something deeper-a burst of applause interrupted here-what is the root of the problem, ferret it out and correct it."

Cheryl Rich silently nodding her head, the board members leaned forward to catch all his words, the old clock on the wall behind them, running 30 minutes slow, ticked by as Myron Simmons said, "Why did you ask...as though everyone already knew the answer, but the question was not actually answered."

Principal	\$ 20,066
2 Secretaries (approx.)	15,000
Total	\$ 35,066

This does not actually show the total costs of the various administrative branches, because with this growth in personnel there is an equal growth in needs for office space, new desks, telephones, intercoms, typewriters, chairs, travel expenses (total budgeted this year \$12,900) and what do we get for this?

**Hoh hears Biologist**

Bill Wood, Washington Department of Fisheries biologist, gave a talk and slide show last week for the Hoh Fisheries Seminar series on the Hoh Reservation. He explained the scope of his work on the west side of the Olympic Peninsula. His main function is to find out the current status of salmon stocks in his area which extends from the Quinalt River to the Soos River. This includes determining the escapement of adult salmon to the spawning grounds, determining abundance and distribution of juveniles, and recommending regulations that reflect the stock status.

Wood is in charge of the Forks office which was established nearly two years ago in response to need for more intensive management. Most of his work has been involved with making an inventory of the area to determine fishery needs and priorities. He also assists in investigating environmental problems, such as logging damage to streams. Juvenile salmon plants to under-utilized streams are also carried out. Wood works closely with tribal fishery biologists in gathering data and determining salmon stock status.

**Forks wildlife agent promoted**

Bob Forbes, Forks' State Wildlife Agent, has been promoted to Area Wildlife Agent in Mt. Vernon.

Bob, his wife Marsha, son Robby, 7, and daughter Kara, 16, will be moving soon. They've already bought a house over there. The Forbes came to Forks last July, after he had worked in Juneau, Alaska, in a civilian job. Before that, he had worked for the Game Dept. in Sequim and Belfair.

The conference is part of an international project on Global Atmosphere; he is to take part with other scientists taking air flows over and around mountains and the problems involved. **The Amateur Botanist**

By Sydney Keegan

Two weeks ago we made our first tour of the bog, and made some observations on its structure. We inspected an outer ring of brush and undergrowth, charmed by Salmonberry, salar, clumpers of Verratum, the large summer leaves of Skunk-cabbage, real huckleberries and "fool's huckleberry" (so named because of the obvious resemblance of the urn-shaped flowers to those of true huckleberry or blueberry plants). Bunch-berry Dogwood and Starflower.

If we enter this brushy area from the road and move towards the north side of the bog, we will see a second, intermediate zone in which the brush is somewhat less dense. This secondary zone is almost entirely restricted to the northern and southern ends.

On the east the tree crowd close, and on the west the highway interrupts the natural flow of vegetation. Here, thick ozy black hummocks are dotted with hundreds of pale pink and white Starflowers, and the Labrador Tea (Ladum grandicum?) is present in abundance.

Look for a rhododendron-like shrub with tightly-packed heads of small white fragrant flowers at the ends of the stems. The heads are about 3 inches across, and the flowers themselves about 1/2 inch, and similar to a small azalea blossom. The leaves point downwards, are a dull leathery green and covered with fluffy reddish wool on the underside.

Another member of the Heath family, it comes into bloom after its showy pink-flowered relative, the Swamp Laurel (which first drew our attention to this spot) has faded and is going to seed.

A scent similar to that of apple blossoms comes drifting, and we notice all around the edge of the bog trees, some tall and some just saplings, bearing clusters of flowers. ## Hospital plans tours for expectant parents

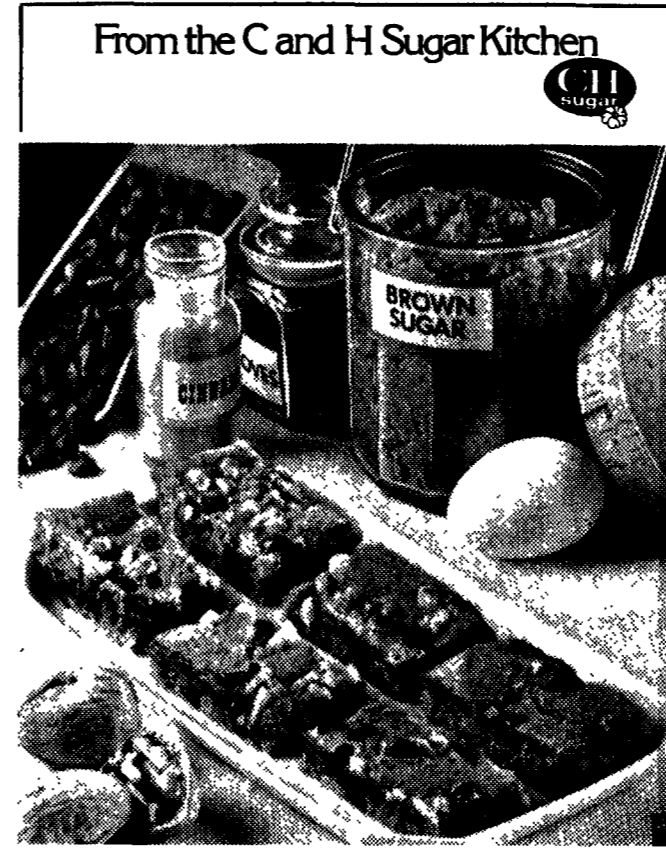
