#### DuPont Estate Goes To Foundation

WEST CHESTER, Pa. (A) - Most of the multi-million-dollar estate of the late Pierre S. du Pont will go to a foundation to keep up his famed Longwood Gardens, near Kennett Square, Pa., it was disclosed Thursday in a copy of the industrialist's will on file in the Chester County courts.

Du Pont, former president and board chairman of E. I. du Pont de Nemours and Co., Inc., died last April 5 at Longwood, He was 84, and the oldest member of the du Pont family which built and operated one of the world's largest industrial firms. His estate was estimated for

probate purposes at 40 million dollars when the will first was filed in Delaware, which claimed him as a resident. Later estimates indicated the total may reach twice as much. A copy later was filed in Chester County for administration of the estate's Pennsylvania assets.

Many Rate 2 accounts will now be entitled to rate three even though electric heat is installed in customer's home. This will result in an estimated average reduction of \$30.00 per year for those accounts having electric range, water heater and electric heat with peak limiting control on water heater only. No load limiting controls needed on future installations of electric space heating on either rate 2 or 3 of the residential schedules.

While no major rate reduction is possible to existing low rate three accounts, this schedule has been liberalized materially as to use of space heating heretofore prohibited. To determine estimated cost of electric space heating customers should assume that 15% of KWHrs. used will cost an average of 1 cent per KWHr. and the excess at an average of 1.25 cents per KWHr., without load limiting or time limiting of the service.
