

SOUND FACTORS Like yesterday's leadoff witness. President G. Keith Funston of the New York Stock Exchange, Mc-Cormick said current high prices are based on such sound factors as strong business activity and con-

fidence of investors. McCormick on the whole voiced a firmer degree of confidence in the market outlook than did Funston, who said the possibility of a 1929-type crash can't be ruled out. Funston said he himself, however, is continuing to buy stocks.

The American Stock Exchange. which McCormick heads, is one of the two securities exchanges in his country with nationwide falallities. It has 1,800 members in 447 cities and its trading volume is second only to that of the New York exchange. McCormick said in his prepared

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
