"During the past 80 years, Germany has brought on herself and on Europe, three chaotic wars which wrought terrific devastation and almost caused her own total destruction," Mrs. Tomlinson said.

"The German people with whom we six delegates to Rosenheim lived and talked, admit that Germany has been to blame. But we feel that all this catastrophe is due to the Germans' proneness to follow strong leaders who directed them to evil ways."

DESCRIBES BAVARIA Mrs. Tomlinson reviewed the industry, economy, political aspects and architecture of Bavaria. She commented, "Industrially, economically and spiritually, Germany has made almost unbelievable progress since World War II Everywhere we saw evidence of prosperity and improvement in liv-

ing conditions." She attributed this to the stabilization of currency in June 1948, help from the Marshall plan and the "unceasing toil of all of the German people, men, women and children,"

"Much of the present prosperity" of Germany is due to Economics Minister Ludwig Erhard who was instrumental in stabilizing the currency and in ushering in a program of industrial rebuilding," she said. "It is thought Erhard" someday will step into the shoes of Chancellor Conrad Adenaur." 


