Ray Clinton Whitson, 33, was booked Thursday on suspicion of a crime against a child. The girl, Joyce Irene Pestotnik, is being held by juvefile authorities as a victim of statutory rape.

The FBI said it questioned Whitson as a possible Navy deserter. Long Beach detectives said Whitson's wife is living in Scattle. They said he and the girl came here last February after leaving his car, Movius and Fooge planned to commit suicide, on a Puget Sound ferry.

Method: Cut heart-shaped pieces of aluminum foil big enough to accommodate the fillets. On each piece of foil, place a fillet near the edge; spread fish with mustard. Cut mushrooms into lengthwise slices, through crown and stem, and arrange on fish. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Dot butter and parsley sprigs. Fold the other side of the foil over this, crimp the edges together so they are tightly sealed. Bake at 425 degrees 12 to 15 minutes.
