







New rates on summer home lots under special use permits in the national forests will become effective January 1, 1956. ment carne from Portland from Regional Forester J. Herbert

The new rates are the result of a nation-wide study extending over several years, the purpose of which was a re-examination of the summer home lot fee structure. Stone pointed out that no increase in fees for the use of summer home lots has occurred in recent years. "Many summer home permittees have been expecting such an increase in the face of rising prices generally," he said. New minimum rates which apply to certain areas have already been established. For the more desirable summer home sites, increases above the minimum rate


