

THE FAMILY TAX BURDEN

The estimate of all taxes to be collected in fiscal 1969 by federal, state and local governments averages out to about \$3,927 per American family.

That's up \$370 from fiscal 1968, says the Tax Foundation, Inc. Thirteen years ago, taxes collected by all government were equivalent to \$1,897 per family.

This estimate is based on anticipated tax receipts of \$247 billion in fiscal 1959 and will be \$147 billion higher than fiscal 1956. Tax receipts by the federal government alone will have more than doubled since 1956, while state-local tax receipts will be close to tripling during the same period of

This ever-increasing tax burden on the American taxpayer points up the immediate need for careful screening of expenditures, elimination of overlappieg projects, and the setting of priorities at all levels of government.
