

WAGE INFLATION

Strikes continue their uptrend, 47 million mandays being lost in 1968—or 12 percent more than in 1967. Furthermore, the price of settling or avoiding strikes was often a sharp increase in unit labor costs.

The wages and salaries paid by private industry were 9.5 percent higher overall in 1968 than in 1967, and average hourly earnings rose 7.4 percent. Major collective-bargaining settlements produced an average first-year rise of 7.5 percent compared with 5.6 percent in 1967 and 4.8 percent in 1966.

At the same time, productivity in the private economy, as estimated by the Council of Economic Advisors, rose only 3.3 percent—about in line with the postwar average. The result: since wage increases exceeded productivity gains, unit costs rose 3.9 percent. According to the economic letter of the First National City Bank of New York, this was only partly offset by increased prices.

It is high time that labor leaders acknowledge the economic facts of life—gains in productivity must balance wage gains if the inflationary spiral is to be smothered.






