#### Local High School Star Art Sandison on U. S. Team Now in Europe

Two Washington State University track stars will be members of the United States team which will compete at Malmo, Sweden, July 24.

Coach Jack Mooberry states that Art Sandison, Port Angeles, and Larry Scheurer, Bellevue, are named to the U.S. team for the Swedish meet and also for competition on the European continent later.

Sandison is one of this nation's best at 800 meters and Scheurer is an outstanding sprinter.

Sandison was second in the NCAA 880 at Knoxville, Tenn., with a new school record time of 1:46.1 and Scheurer placed sixth in the 220 and anchored WSU's sixth place 440 relay team in the nationals. Both later placed in the National AAU finals at Mia-

Sandison and Scheurer flew to Sweden after joining the full U.S. team in New York. After the meet in Sweden, the two WSU athletes are scheduled to join another U. S. team competing at Stuttgart, Germany.

Coach Mooberry is heading for Stuttgart and the meet which will pit the best athletes from the Western Hemisphere against Europe. July 29. He'll serve as one of the U.S. Coaches at that meet. The American team also will have a meet at Augsburg, Germany, against the West German team and in London against the Brit-

Sandison and Scheurer both are juniors at Washington State with another year of competition remaining. Sandison was the Pacific-8 champion at 880 yards this spring and Sandison anchored the Cougar 440 relay team to school record times of 40.1 in the qualifying heat and finals at the NCAA meet in Knoxville.



#### CHAOS IN CONSTRUCTION

One of the greatest problems facing us today is adequate housing for American families within their financial ability to

rent or buy. There has been utter confusion as to where the housing responsibility lies. Some say, "Let Uncle Sam do it with public projects." But overburdened taxpayers, including those in need of housing, see the dangers in this approach.

Some earnest citizens blame zoning laws, others the building codes. These points are debatable. The basic answer may be found in a single word: money.

The National Association of Manufacturers has become concerned with the accelerating building costs and has published a study entitled, "Chaos in the Construction Industry."

The opening paragraph sums up the story: "Labor conditions in the \$90 billion construction industry have reached proportions which demand the urgent attention of both the private and public sectors. Aggravated by highly inflationary contract settlements, excessive work stoppages and stifling work practices, the labor problems in this industry present a dramatic threat to the national economy as well as to the

industry in general." While the private non-farm economy experienced a 2.9 percent annual increase in productivity from 1959 to 1966, the construction industry experienced a .3 percent annual decrease in productivity for the same period. The median wage increases in construction have gone up three times that of other industries.

Isn't it about time that labor leaders consider their responsibility to the public in this issue?




