





















# HIGHLIGHTS OF 2022



An inaugural meeting in January launched NOLS' work with SHKS Architects to develop plans for the **Sequim Library Expansion and Renovation** project. At a community meeting in September, SHKS presented renderings of the modern library with improved critical infrastructure, designed to be sustainable, accessible, and adaptable to meet community needs.

The vehicle build for NOLS' new **Bookmobile** has been underway, exterior graphics were designed by Sequim-based illustrator Matthew Fleming, and many staff members have been busily planning for operations, collections management, and technological services.



NOLS launched a **new catalog** in May. Its powerful new searching capabilities provide many improvements including easy discovery of items in all formats, as well as the ability to access digital materials directly from the catalog.

Nearly **4,000 new library cards** were issued, including to a couple who came in for library cards as a "date night" activity.

NOLS teamed up with the North Olympic Land Trust and the Jamestown S'Klallam Tribal Library to offer an **Earth Day program series** including a salmon life cycle beading project and a scavenger hunt at the Lyre Conservation Area.

2,848 people of all ages signed up for the **Summer Reading Challenge** and 1,536 people logged their reading for at least 30 days, earning a T-shirt and grand prize entry.

The summer **Discovery Club** series for kids featured outdoor activities like knot tying, Take a Haiku, and STEAM stations.

Instructors from Hālau Hula Ka Lei Mokihana I Ka Ua Noe hosted interactive **hula dancing** demonstrations for all ages.

**Books and Locations** paired outdoor places on the North Olympic Peninsula with the perfect book to read there.

New programs focused on **board games and puzzles** encouraged community members to gather and play.

Through the **Smithsonian Institution Traveling Exhibition Service**, NOLS displayed exhibitions for Asian American and Pacific Islander Heritage Month and Hispanic Heritage Month.

Author Jamie Ford presented Racebending: Adventures in a Bi-Cultural World, and Summer Michaud-Skog discussed her book Fat Girls Hiking: An Inclusive Guide to Getting Outdoors at Any Size or Ability. Author Donna Barba Higuera visited fourth grade students on the West End to discuss Lupe Wong Won't Dance.

In partnership with Clallam County Department of Health and Human Services, over 12,000 **Covid test kits** were handed out for free at NOLS locations.

The Clallam Resilience Project, NOLS, and partners throughout the county provided **Resilience Month** events and resources.

Virtual programs that increased NOLS reach and accessibility included the **Olympic National Park Perspectives Speaker Series** and two presentations by the **Humanities Washington Speakers Bureau**.

Early literacy programs welcomed young children and their caregivers for ongoing Storytime activities including a new **Bilingual Family Storytime** in Forks, and the **Fostering Readers** program in Sequim for kids learning how to read.

Children in first through third grades had the opportunity to join a new **Kids Book Club** in Port Angeles.

The second annual **Indigenous Peoples Day Poetry Reading**, held at the ?a?k<sup>w</sup>ustəŋáwtx<sup>w</sup> House of Learning, Peninsula College Longhouse and on Zoom, included readings by local native poets and featured reader, Sara Marie Ortiz.

**Red Yarn** delighted family audiences in Forks, Port Angeles, and Sequim with folksongs, puppetry, and high-energy shows.

More than **15,700 books and other materials** were added to NOLS collection. This included nontraditional items such as Kids Nature Backpacks, Pickleball sets and a Shore Aquatic Center pool pass as part of the **NOLS Gear** collection.

An **Older Adult Services Librarian** position was added. Based in Sequim, the position has coordinated programming such as the popular Intentional Aging series.

Consultant NFP conducted an external **compensation study project** and provided a final report. These findings resulted in successful negotiations and approval of **new Collective Bargaining Agreements** for the General Employees Unit (GEU) and Managers Employee Unit (MEU).

NOLS, with grant funding from Washington State Library, partnered with United Way of Clallam County and Peninsula College to begin offering information sessions about **student** financial aid, FAFSA, and WASFA.

Meeting rooms opened for public reservations again after being unavailable for over two years due to the pandemic.

# ABOUT YOUR LIBRARY

The North Olympic Library System (NOLS) is a junior taxing district serving all of Clallam County, Washington. NOLS is primarily funded through property taxes, with a 2022 levy rate of 38¢ per \$1,000 of assessed property valuation. The Library also receives funding from fees, investments, and miscellaneous charges. It is governed by a five-member governing Board of Trustees. Trustees are appointed at large by the Clallam County Commissioners for five-year terms.

The System consists of the main library in Port Angeles and branches in Clallam Bay, Forks, and Sequim, as well as outreach services for patrons who cannot travel to the library, and an array of online services. The NOLS collection includes about 300,000 items ranging from books and DVDs, to eBooks and streaming music, to telescopes and community passes. The Library also offers Wi-Fi access, public computers, a full calendar of programs for all ages, community meeting rooms, and more.
