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Port Angeles Main Library to host model

of Billy Frank Jr. statue August 19-24, visitors welcome

Artist Haiying Wu's final statue will be cast in bronze and installed at National Statuary Hall in 2025

Port Angeles, WA – The North Olympic Library System (NOLS) will host a model of Nisqually tribal leader and activist Billy Frank Jr. from Monday, Aug. 19, to Saturday, Aug. 24, in the Port Angeles Main Library, 2210 S. Peabody St. The model is a copy of the clay model made by renowned Chinese American sculptor Haiying Wu as he developed his vision for a statue of the late Nisqually leader. Wu is developing this model into an 11-foot tall clay statue, which will be cast in bronze before installation at National Statuary Hall in Washington, D.C. The model's tenure in Port Angeles represents a special opportunity for the public to see Wu's craftsmanship up close and experience history in the making.

"The Library is honored to host this model sculpture of Billy Frank Jr. and informational posters to help visitors learn about his key role in advocating for Native American rights and tribal sovereignty," said Noah Glaude, NOLS Executive Director. "It provides an opportunity to reflect on the impact of historical and contemporary issues faced by Indigenous peoples." A Northwest Indian Fisheries Commission meeting held in Port Angeles the week of Aug. 19 has provided the opportunity for the model to travel to the area and for local residents to view the model.

Billy Frank Jr., born on March 9, 1931, was a Nisqually tribal member. He fought tirelessly to ensure that the United States government would honor the promises made in the treaties with Washington tribes. His unwavering commitment to the fight against racism and abuse has had global influence. In 2015, he was posthumously awarded the presidential medal of freedom by President Barack Obama.

Members of the public are invited to view the model during the library's open hours, 10 a.m. to 7 p.m. Monday through Thursday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Friday, and 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday.
