

on the seventh night of Hanukkah and receives acts of kindness while exploring the city.








The Library Book by Susan Orlean Chronicles the Los Angeles Public Library fire and its aftermath and reexamines the case of Harry Peak, the actor long suspected of setting the fire. This account showcases the larger, crucial role that libraries play in our lives, and delves into the evolution of libraries across the around the world; from their humble beginnings as a metropolitan charitable initiative, to their current status as a cornerstone of national identity.

The Line Becomes a River by Francisco Cantu For Francisco Cantú, the border is in the blood: his mother, a park ranger and daughter of a Mexican

immigrant, raised him in the scrublands of the Southwest. Haunted by the landscape of his youth, Cantú joins the Border Patrol. He and his partners are posted to remote regions crisscrossed by drug routes and smuggling corridors, where they learn to track other humans under blistering sun and through frigid nights. Plagued by nightmares, he abandons the Patrol for civilian life. But when an immigrant friend travels to Mexico to visit his dying mother and does not return, Cantú discovers that the border has migrated with him, and now he must know the whole story.






Crossing the Animas by James Best With his new home in Durango, Colorado, and marriage on the horizon, the last thing Steve Dancy wants


is trouble. But when a quarrel with a mining tycoon and his henchmen endangers Dancy's fiancée and friends, he has no choice but to fight.



Walking With Peety: The Dog Who Saved My Life by Eric O'Grey Eric was 150 pounds overweight and depressed. After a lifetime of failed diets and the onset of type 2 diabetes, he went to a doctor who surprisingly prescribed a shelter dog. And that's when Eric met Peety: an overweight, middle-aged, and forgotten dog. The two adopted each other and began an incredible journey together that forever changed their lives.

Force of Nature by Jane Harper Five colleagues are forced to go on a corporate retreat in the wilderness, but one of the women doesn't come out of the woods. And each of her companions tells a slightly different story about what happened. Federal Police Agent Aaron Falk discovers secrets lurking in the mountains, and a tangled web of personal and professional friendship, suspicion, and betrayal among the hikers. But did that lead to murder?


The Friend by Sigrid Nunez When a woman unexpectedly loses her lifelong best friend, she finds herself burdened with the unwanted dog he has left behind – a Great Dane traumatized by the inexplicable disappearance of its master, and by the threat of eviction. But while troubles abound, rich and surprising rewards lie in store for both of them.

Grist Mill Road by Christopher Yates The year is 1982; the setting, an Edenic hamlet some ninety miles north of New York City. There, among the craggy rock cliffs and glacial ponds of timeworn mountains, three friends are bound together by a terrible and seemingly senseless crime. Twenty-six years later, living lives their younger selves never could have predicted, the three meet again - with even more devastating results.

Now That You Mention It by Kristan Higgins After being hit by a van and breaking up with her boyfriend, Nora Stuart returns home to a tiny Maine community but after fifteen years it seems she's not really wanted there. Balancing loss and opportunity, Nora will discover that tackling old pain makes room for promise and the chance to begin again.

The Storm by Arif Anwar Shahryar, a recent Ph.D. graduate and father of nine-year-old Anna, must leave the US when his visa expires. Shahryar tells Anna the history of his country, beginning in a village on the Bay of Bengal. Their story intersects with those of a Japanese fighter pilot, a British female doctor stationed in Burma during World War II, a Buddhist monk originally from Austria, and a privileged couple in Calcutta.





The Mistletoe Secret by Richard Paul Evans A moving story of two people who brave loneliness to find love.


Politically Correct Holiday Stories: For an Enlightened Yuletide Season by James Finn Garner The author sets the record straight on

The Man Who Invented Christmas (2018) The journey that led to Charles Dickens' creation of A Christmas Carol.


FROM PAGE TO SCREEN

The Zookeeper's Wife by Diane Ackerman When Germany invaded Poland, bombers devastated Warsaw and the city's zoo along with it. With most of their animals dead, zookeepers Jan and Antonina Zabinski began smuggling Jews into the empty cages. Antonina kept the unusual household afloat, caring for both its human and its animal inhabitants.

The Circle by Dave Eggers When Mae Holland is hired to work for the world's most powerful internet company, she can't believe her luck. The Circle, links users' online data with their universal operating system. But the story of one woman's ambition and idealism soon becomes a heart-racing novel of suspense, raising questions about memory, history, privacy, and democracy.



Red Sparrow by Jason Matthews In today's Russia, intelligence officer Dominika Egorova struggles to survive in the post-Soviet bureaucracy. Ordered to become a "Sparrow," a trained seductress, Dominika is assigned to Nathaniel Nash, who handles the CIA's most important Russian mole. The two operatives collide in a duel of spycraft, deception, and forbidden passion.



The Guernsey Literary and Potato Peel Pie Society by Mary Ann Shaffer In 1946, as London emerges from the shadow of World War II, author Juliet Ashton is having a terrible time finding inspiration for her next book. Then she receives a letter from Guernsey Island, and learns of a unique book club formed as an alibi to protect its members from arrest by the occupying Germans during the war. Captivated, she sets sail for Guernsey, and what she finds there will change her life forever.

The Shack by William P.Young Missy has been abducted during a family vacation and evidence that she may have been brutally murdered is found in an abandoned shack. Four years later in the midst of his great sadness, her father receives a note, apparently from God, inviting him back to that shack for a weekend. Arriving at the shack, he walks back into his darkest nightmare, but what he finds will change his world forever.

The Snowman by Jo Nesbo Harry Hole investigates the disappearance of a woman whose scarf is found on a mysteriously built snowman, a case that is complicated by subsequent abductions and a menacing letter.

The Handmaid's Tale by Margaret Atwood This look at the near future presents the story of Offred, a Handmaid in the Republic of Gilead - an oppressive world where women are no longer allowed to read and are valued only as long as they are viable for reproduction.




AROUND OUTREACH
