



To Whom It May Concern: In obedience to the State Constitution, and the Joint Resolution of the State Legislature hereinafter referred to, there is hereby published for the consideration of the voters of the State of Washington, a proposed amendment to the constitution of the said state, as follows: mendment to the constitution of the said state, as follows:


