The State Game Department recently received notice that civil and criminal jurisdiction over the "Corridor" addition to the Olympic National Park has been accepted by the United States Secretary of the Interior.

This means that none of the provisions of the state game code shall apply to the area, as is also true in the Park. This is in keeping with National Park Service policy which classifies national parks as "inviolate sanctuaries", allowing mo hunting within park boundaries.






