SOLICITATIONS TO BEGIN NOVEMBER 4, 1965

Billy Gossett has joined the Operation End-All team as Chairman of the Other Business Division. He and the Division Chairman wish to thank all of the workers who have so generously volunteered their time to assist in this important community work.

The campaign will commence on November 5 and will continue until December 31, by which time it is expected that the \$12,000 goal will be achieved.

Operation End-All was organized by your Community Council to eliminate as far as possible all fund drives in this community. With the exception of the Quillayute Valley School District Scholarship Fund, the 1966 fund drive should suggest this. The committee suggests that if an individual solicitation is made in 1966 that contributions be withheld from the fund referred to the Community Council. This does not apply to your local church affiliation or to the bake sales or other sales by local organizations.

Let's keep Forks growing in all directions by including full participation in this important phase of community life.

Loggers from all over the Northwest and Canada will park their trucks next week and head for Portland, Oregon to register for the 66th annual Pacific Logging Congress at the Hilton Hotel, starting on November 7, more than 2,000 logging delegates and logging equipment manufacturers are expected to attend business sessions of the Congress, November 8-10, and discuss ways and means of solving some of their more pressing problems.

On the theme of "The Challenge of Complete Utilization," Robert B. Kennedy, Bly Logging Company, Klamath Falls, Oregon, and President of the Congress, will call the first session to order at 9:30 a.m. Nov. 8. Oregon's Governor Mark Hatfield will welcome the delegates to the state, and Otis D. Hall, Crown Zellerbach Corporation, San Francisco, vice president of the Congress, will respond to the governor's welcome.

The keynote address will be delivered Monday morning by John A. Carver Jr., Under-Secretary of the Interior, Washington, D. C. Dr. John Grantham, Pacific Northwest Forest & Range Experiment Station, Portland, will lead off the second business session of the day with a speech on "Should Market Demand Alone Determine Woods Utilization."

Panel sessions on rubber-tired skidders and small tractors, cable systems, handling of poles and saplings, utilization of small and defective timber will be held Tuesday, November 9.

Several events have been arranged to entertain the ladies attending the Congress. On Monday they will attend a Banquet 202' Ten at the Hoyt Hotel, and on Tuesday they will hear Mrs. Virginia Stanton, Carmel, Cal., party editor of House Beautiful Magazine, speak on and demonstrate "Holiday Entertaining With A Flair" in the Pavilion room of the Hilton.

Wednesday, November 10, the loggers will hear a report from their resolutions committee and attend the traditional windup program featuring nine sessions discussing on "What's New in Logging," George Drake, Shelton, Wash., will moderate the session.

In recognition of these hazardous and ever-present hazards, Sheriff Polhamus quotes from two applicable State statutes:

R.C.W. 9A.12.030, *Arming or Discharging Firearms*. Every person who shall willfully discharge any firearm, air gun or other weapon, or shall willfully discharge a missile in a public place, or in any place where any person might be endangered thereby, although no injury result, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

R. C. W. 9A.12.040, *Use of Firearms by Minor*. No minor under the age of fourteen years shall handle or have in his possession or under his control, except while accompanied by or under the immediate charge of his parent or guardian, any firearm of any kind for hunting or target practice or for other purposes. Every person violating any of the foregoing provisions, or aiding or knowingly permitting any such minor to violate the same, shall be guilty of a misdemeanor.

All citizens who want to show support of their government's military efforts in South Vietnam have been asked to take part in "Operation Boost" on Veteran's Day, November 11, by Commander Bobby F. Earley of Forks Post 9108, the Veterans of Foreign Wars.

"Operation Boost" is a nationwide project sponsored by the Veterans of Foreign Wars as a counter-measure to demonstrations against America's participation in the Vietnam war. Citizens are being asked to take part in patriotic demonstrations such as Veteran's Day parades and public meetings. The V.F.W. has also suggested that each individual stop whatever he is doing at 11 a.m. and offer a silent prayer for American soldiers now fighting in Vietnam.

Commander-in-Chief Andy Borg who is now touring the Southeast Asia battle ground said it is vitally important that the nation's Vietnam policy represent only a small minority of our population.

"A mass show of support such as 'Operation Boost' is necessary for the Communist enemy has come to believe that they can win their victory over a freedom-loving people of Vietnam because the American people no longer support their own government. Second, while our soldiers are still performing their military duties manfully, they are becoming disgusted and embittered by the failure of some American citizens to support them in their fight for freedom."

WHEREAS: Operation End-All is an annual time of contribution in the town of Forks and surrounding area—and has been recognized by all such supported community projects, groups and national charity organizations—and

WHEREAS: The proceeds of this worthy fund-raising campaign are used exclusively for the betterment of the community and the aiding of charitable organizations, both local and national—and

WHEREAS: The basic purpose of the campaign is to eliminate as far as possible fund-raising drives in this community—

Earl L. Kennedy, Mayor of the Town of Forks, do hereby recognize the generous merits of this cause by trying the citizens of this community to contribute generously to its support, through contributions and pledges to Operation End-All.

The 1965 hunting season is in full swing once again and the sheriff's office is receiving a flood of firearms complaints.

In calling public attention to the performance of the situation involved, Sheriff Polhamus points out that numerous areas here and elsewhere are still remembered as such, are now off limits to 1965 hunters. These areas are now being developed and before many hunters are well along, creating an extremely hazardous situation with respect to the discharging of firearms thereabout.

Winning bids totaled \$477,725 on 12 sales of state-owned timber in nine counties Monday and Tuesday, Land Commissioner Bert L. Cole announced today.

The bids were 94 percent over the appraised price of the timber sold. There were no bids on two of the 14 timber stands offered at public auction.

The largest and most valuable sale was \$439,000 board feet in the Sarapin Creek Pine Beetle sale, which had been appraised at \$30,982. Northlife Lumber Company of Seattle won 85 percent over the appraised value in bidding \$160,000 for the beetle-infested timber stand in Okanogan county.

State timber sales during the first four months of fiscal year 1965 have totaled \$2,078,243, which is 38 percent more than the total for the fiscal year 1964.

Other October sales were as follows:

JEFFERSON COUNTY - Export Pacific Inc. of Tacoma bid \$11,725 for the Deepwater Creek Blowdown No. 2 sale, 795,000 board feet, which had been appraised at \$11,725.

M & T Timber Inc. of Port Angeles bid \$20,000 for 41,000 board feet, which had been appraised at \$19,855.

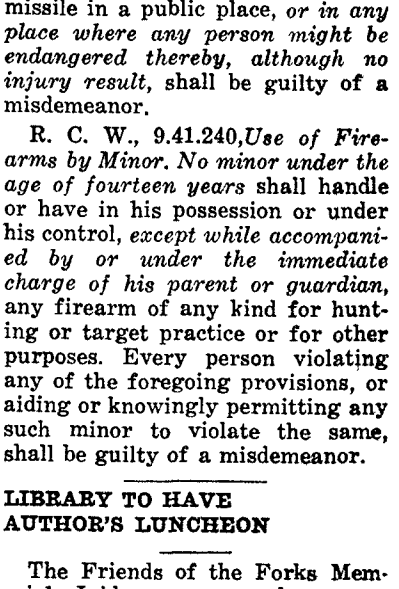
