Mansfield Wins Primary Vote In Tuesday Election

Thomas Mansfield, (D), retained his bid for Clallam County Commissioner in Tuesday's Primary Election. A total of 543 votes was polled by Mansfield.

The primary voting was disturbingly light, considering the fact that only 6,584 votes were cast out of 13,104 registered voters in the county. These are the total votes cast in the West End Precincts:

Forks No. 1—148; Forks No. 2—166 votes; Sun—114 votes; Bogach—99 votes; Beaver—70 votes; Tyee—81 votes; Quillayute—57 votes; La Push—30 votes; Clallam Bay—118 votes; Clallam (Sekiu)—84 votes; West Bay—81 votes; Hoko—37 votes.

Huskies Meet Air Force Saturday

With a positive guarantee that this year's final game will not resemble a baseball game, the offensively-minded University of Washington football team will turn its attentions on the military this Saturday at Husky Stadium.

The Husky Coach Jim Owens, the two previous meetings with the Academy have been two of the most frustrating games Owens has encountered in his nine-plus years of coaching at Washington. Prompted by some intangible force that wins close, low-scoring ball games, the Falcons have tested the Huskies in both meetings, winning 10-7 in 1963 and 8-0 in 1964.

There is little doubt that both football camps as to the possibility that this year's game will not be as close as in previous years, but there is also a good chance that more points will show up on the scoreboard in this, the second game of the season.

Bowling For Better Scores

When you "release" the ball on the lane you should keep your bowling arm coming straight upward. Your arm should come up at least to shoulder level, but if you wish to go higher, it is permissible. Remember to keep your arm in the same arc throughout the swing. If you do not pull your arm across your body to the left as you release the ball, in addition, you should not stop your hand action or "lock" your hand back as you release the ball.

If you stop your hand action at the point of release, the ball will lose its striking power when it hits the pins because it is no longer rotating but is skidding. Since bowlers call this a "skid ball", therefore, remember to keep your arm coming straight up after you have released the ball. Once this motion follows through has been perfected, you will find that the direction line and the hitting of the target will be more consistent, which means better scoring.

Now you would like to stress that when your bowling ball is released, it is rolled down the lane, and NOT "thrown". The ball must be "lifted" over the foot line (not on or before), to aid in lifting your ball over the foot line. I recommend that you reach out for your spot or target on the lane, keeping in mind that during the entire pendulum swing, your arm is held close to your body. At the point of release, the thumb always comes out of the ball first—the fingers remaining momentarily to support the ball to give your ball an effective roll.
