Position at the Foul Line Last of Seven Articles

In all sports, form plays a very important part and powling is no exception. If you finish badly at the foul line, then you have improperly performed some basic part of the four-step delivery. If all the steps had been executed properly, you would finish with your sliding foot pointing directly toward the pins. Your shoulders will be parallel to the foul line. Your sliding knee would be bent slightly to insure a perfect slide and to maintain good balance.
