



Although medical science has not liscovered the exact cause of osoriasis, much more is known about its complexity today than in the past. Psoriasis is not an infecttion and certainly is not contagious. It is likely that a psoriatic tendency

is hereditary. Injury to the skin is the most common fector precipitating the appearance of psoriatic lesions. Changes in the season cause a variation in the lesions. Psoriasis usually improves during the summer and worsens during the winter. Cortisone and the newer steriods usually produce initial improvement but the condition returns when use f the medication is liscontinued. In many instances psoriasis responds well to sunlight at the beach outdoors elsewhere, particularly during the summer.

There are medications that your physician can prescribe to help remove the scales and ease the itching. Until there is more knowledge of the many mysteries of this skin problem, the patient's understanding of the disease and sympathetic nderstanding by his friends, family, physician and others will greatly lessen the burden for those who must live with psoriasis.
