Don't Argue With A Train

Are there any railroad crossings near your home that you cross regularly? If so, don't forget how dangerous they can be, warns Kent Stoner of the Allstate Motor Club. Almost 200 people will lose their lives this year in auto train crashes at railroad crossings, most of which occur within 25 miles of their homes. It is especially alarming, Stoner points out, because 40% of the motorists involved are in violation of warning devices. Stoner asks that motorists be particularly careful at railroad






