"When I drive I notice that commercial vehicle drivers generally observe safe driving practices, they maintain reasonable speeds, they follow at safe distances, they signal well in advance of turning or lane changing, in short, they practice courtesy and common sense. I often meet motorists, on the other hand, who surely wouldn't last a week behind the wheel of a truck," he

Courtesy is a fine virtue—no matter what. But in the driving of an automobile on today's busy highways ,it takes on an added bit of importance. Courtesy while driving can run the gamut of easing frayed nerves, to the possibility of saving "For example," says State Patrol Chief Will Bachofner, "anyone who has driven at night knows how irritating it can be to be blinded by another's head lamps." Not only is t hard on the nerves, but it can become exceedingly difficult to see through the spots dancing in front of one's eyes. It can be very tempting to "repay in mind", unless the victim of the offending driver's carelessness is remarkably even tempered. Occasionally someone loses his self-control almost completely, and steers straight at the offending vehicle in a fit of rage. Such extreme action is, of course, ill advised—and could be suicidal. The test for you is to keep your composure if you should chance upon a driver who fails to dim his vehicle's head lamps from high beam. Perhaps by flicking your light switch up and down, you may attract his attention sufficiently to alert him to your problem. If he doesn't catch on, Chief Bachofner cautions that you don't become enraged and attempt to blind him by placing your lamps on high beam. "This," according to the Chief, "only brings about two partially blinded drivers driving toward each other." Better to forgive the other fellow; keep your eyes to the right of the roadway so as not to become too blinded by his lamps, and drive cautiously until he has passed by One other word of cautiondon't you be the driver who forgets to dim his head lamps.
