What Happens To School Programs When Property Taxpayers Revolt?

The failure of special maintenance and operation levies in three first-class school districts in Washington has created so many serious problems that everyone can plainly see that this antiquated method of financing the schools has "had it."

The three districts are Bellingham, South Kitsap and Port Angeles, Each has been well run for years but is now forced to make substantial cuts in both certificated and non-certificated personnel, to increase class size, to drop courses and to require fees.

Fourteen years ago this community was judged as being the state's first "All American City" — partly because of its school system. Today, the community is faced with trying to determine what to do as a consequence of tne failure of a \$488,715 maintenance and operation levy. At first it was believed the levy lost by a single vote. A later recount showed it needed five more "yes" votes to meet the 60% plurality requirement. Curtailments to meet this loss will not come easily, since the district was already feeling the pinch of an earlier levy failure in May of 1967.

The loss of accreditation for Port Angeles has already been announced by the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools. The State Board of Education has not at this writing made any pronouncement regarding its

Next year, there will be no athletic competition or other extra-curricular student activities. Port Angeles will probably have to double-shift its lower elementary grades, and slash its student counseling program. The changes in curriculum will involve the dropping of nine high school courses. These include world history, speech, debate, Spanish, a job-oriented home economics class, drama, journalism and some

Thirteen teachers and nineteen non-certificated personnel will be lost. The cutbacks will require two principals to admirister four elementary schools. The counseling program next year will be at the ratio of about one to 1,200 students. The State Board's accreditation standard for high schools is one to 400 students.

These levy failures are a continuation of a statewide revolt against annual special levy financing for the public schools.


Increasing class loads means that high schools stand a good chance of having their accreditation revoked. It means, further, that some colleges will require entrance examinations for their entering freshmen. After admittance to college, students from un-accredited schools will probably have to take additional basic courses which students from accredited schools have already had. This is a time consuming, unnecessary burden to im-

Obviously, the Legislature has failed to comply with Article IX, Section 1 of the State Constitution which states, "It is the paramount" duty of the state to make ample provisions for the education of all children residing within its borders "
