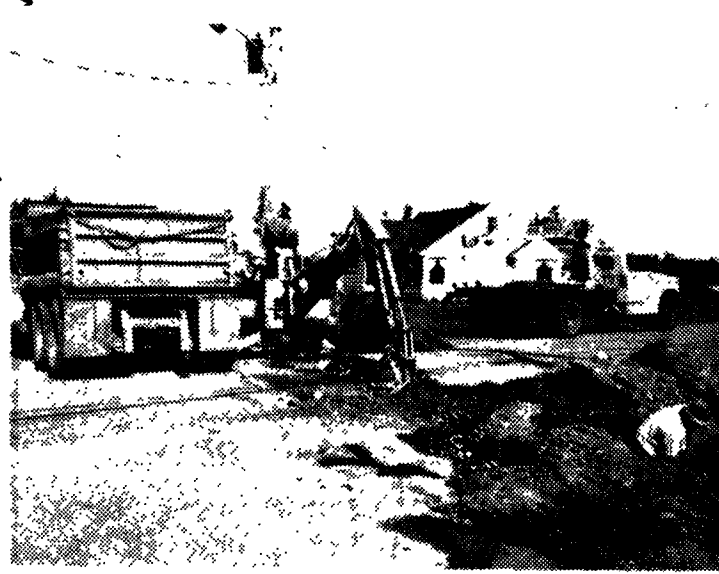
Water Line Construction Underway

Construction of the Forks Water System transmission lines by Wayco Utility Contractor Inc. began last week.

The equipment and crew began laying the pipe from the well at Campbell's Addition to Sol Duc Way. By mid-week the crew had moved to the Calawah Way and 5th Avenue Area. The line runs across 5th Avenue to Division Street and East on Division to the access road to the new tank site located behind the Russ Thomas Ranch.

Reynolds and Ryan Log. Co. were the successful bidders to clear the timber from the tank site. This phase of the job has been completed. Campbell's Trucking was awarded the contract for clearing and excavating the tank site and building the access road to the tank site on Division Street. The successful bids were \$3,800 for clearing and excavation and \$2,000 for building and grading the road to the site.

American General Transportation Company was the successful bidder for construction of the 750,000 gallon water storage tank.

Over 8,000 lineal feet of asbestos pipe will be laid when the job is completed. Wayco's contract also calls for hydrants, the necessary fittings etc. for the line and fittings for the hook-up to the new storage tank.
