



As the Republican nominating convention in Miami Beach approaches...it starts two weeks from today...Richard Nixon appears to be a shoo-in for the party's presidential choice. But backers of Nelson Rockefeller and Ronald Reagan still hope for a political miracle.

From the Rockies to the Hawaiian islands, here's the way it looks state by state...

In Alaska...Favorite son Governor Walter Hickel holds all 12 of the state's votes and all are expected to be cast for Nixon, many other Americans, I reserve probably on the first ballot. Hickel is Nixon's western campaign

> Arizona's 16 votes are officially uncommitted in a delegation headed by Governor Jack Williams but former Senator Barry Goldwater holds the key and he supports Nixon. All 16 expected to go to Nixon on first ballot.

In California...All 86 votes are committed to Governor Ronald Reagan as a favorite son of the first two ballots or until my camp -- ask for moderat conreleased. The delegation has agreement to vote as a unit so if they switch it would deliver all 86...probably to Nixon.

Hawaii... The state's 14 votes are committed to Senator Hiram Fong as a favorite son on the first ballot but Fong is a strong Nixon supporter and an estimated 12 or 14 lear to Nixon. Rockefeller supporters claim 9. situation fluid.

Idaho...Governor Don Samuelson heads a 14-member delegation that is officially uncommitted but split between Nixon and Reagan. Nixon is believed to have eight votes. Reagan six on the first ballot. Nixon backers claim more.

Montana... The state's 14 votes are officially uncommitted but the delegation is headed by Governor Tim Babcock, Co-chairman of Nixon's western campaign. All 14 are expected to go to Nixon on the first ballot, although Reagan has some strength.

Nevada... Governor Paul Laxalt heads the state's 12-member delegation which is formally uncommitted. Delegates heavily favor Nixon but there is some Rockefeller support. situation flex-

Oregon... All 18 votes are pledged to Nixon on the first two ballots by May 28 primary election. The delegation leader is Senator Mark O. Hatfield, who supports Nixon and says he would like to be the vice presidential nominee.

Utah... The delegation is officially uncommitted. It contains five Reagan and three Nixon backers but the state is near the end of the roll call and Nixon's standing at the time could affect

In Washington state... The west's second largest delegation with 24 convention votes is formally uncommitted but 15 delegates solidly for Nixon, sax prefer Reagan and Three Rockefeller. But, again. may be affected by Nixon's current standing.







# Dennis Morgison. Fairholm Background History

Fairholm named by Mrs. Ted Rixon in the early 90's was used as a Ferry Terminal, for Ferry's transporting passengers to and from the Eastside of the lake. One Ferry is all they had at that time. The first ferry was a small passenger steamer put on the lake in 1899. It was called "Lady of the Lake", built at Port Crescent. Then came the Ferry "Flier" which was the first ferry to be built on Lake Crescent. It was also a steam powered boat built by the Barns Brothers. The Fairholm Landing was later sold to Capt. Horne in May 1916, he built the 2nd log house on the beach, which was later sold to Al Fairservice.

Fairholm Landing again was sold in approximately 1928, purchased from the Sol Duc Land Company by Bill and Betty Lenoir and was later named "Lenoirs". It operated under this name until October of 1964. At that time it was resold to the present owner of today's Fairholm Resort, Art and Sheila

Many changes have taken place since the Schotts purchased the historic resort a few years ago. They ve completly remodeled the entire business makand cocktail lounge. They have complete facilities for large banquets and parties. More changes are in store for the resort in the near future to make it even bigger and better for a tourist attraction, recreation area, fishing and much



### Professional Tips for Making Perfect Buttonholes

They parade from neck to hemline on beruffled shirt dresses, emphasize the sidewrap effect of skirts and culoties, help the fit of waistdefining jackets and coats, march down the backs of highcollared blouses, and decorate pocket flaps of suits. Buttons are back-and so are button-

Once the bane of all but the most experienced home sewer, buttonholes are now easy, even fun, to make with the aid of a built-in buttonholer or buttonholer accessory for your sewing machine. Here are some tips on making professionallooking buttonholes from The Singer Company, which has just introduced the new Golden 'Touch & Sew'' 630 sewing machine, the first machine to include both a built-in two-step buttonhole system and a buttonholer accessory.

Which Buttonhole? Most patterns suggest the type of buttonhole that is best for the item you're making, but fabric and personal taste may suggest another type. When in doubt, look at high-priced fashions similar to the garment you're making, to see what the top designers are using. Generally you'll find one of these four basic buttonholes, perhaps

(A1) Bound buttonholes. coats, dresses and suits. They may be made of the same fabric as the garment, or of an-

(A2) Round-end straight buttonholes. They are used on most types of dresses, coats and suits, are easy to make when many buttonholes are required. With a purl-edge, they give a hand-sewn finish to tailored fashions.

(A3) Eyelet-end buttonholes Tailored looking, they are appropriate for use on classic coats and suits. With a purledge, they are exactly right for man-tailored women's fashions with the "Bonnie and Clyde"

(A4) Square-end bar-tack buttonholes. The added reinforcement at the purpose ends, makes them practical for sheer and lightweight fabrics, and extremely good on infants' and

What Size Buttonhole? The pattern you use will indicate what type and size buttons the garment you're making was designed to have. If the button you want isn't available in the specified size, or if you feel that a smaller or larger button suits you better, you can easily make adjustments. Before making the buttonholes, however, buy your buttons.

Then on a scrap of fabric, make sample buttonhole. The length of the slit of the buttonhole should be equal to the diameter + the thickness of the button. If the button has a rough texture, add another 1/8-inch to avoid abrasion. The button should slip through the slit without stretching it, but should be sufficiently snug so

that it won't pop out. When making a sample buttonhole, be sure to duplicate the number of fabric layers in the garment, including interfacing if used. A stay of firm crisp fabric is essential on loosely-woven or stretchy fabrics, and is desirable on other fabrics. Bound buttonholes are stitched through two fabric layers: garment and a stay or interfacing (not hair canvas), before the facing is attached. Worked buttonholes are stitched through three fabric layers: garment, interfacing and facing, after the facing is attached.

The sample buttonhole not only enables you to determine the correct size, but will let you see how it will look on the garment, and help you determine the buttonholing method and machine settings that are best for the fabric you're using.

Pressure should be just heavy enough to hold the material firmly, and tension should be balanced. No special thread is needed for worked buttonholes. Number 50 mercerized cotton and size A silk threads may be used with a size 14 needle. Finer mercerized thread requires a size 11 needle.

### **Placing Buttonholes**

Your pattern will indicate where buttonholes should be placed. However, it may be necessary to change the spacing because of pattern alterations or because the buttons you are using are smaller or rger than the pattern specifies The rules for correctly posi

tioning buttonholes are th same, regardless of type. On women's clothes, the buttonholes are on the right-hand side; on men's wear, the but-

Olympia -- Washington State's gun law, like the new federal law, applies only to purchase and posses-

sion of pistols and short firearms. To purchase a firearm in Wash. with a barrel less than 12 inches long, a person must fill out an application. It includes his physical description, citizenship status a statement as to his purpose in buying the firearm, and a statement that he has never been con-

victed of a "crime of violence." Records of applications to purchase are kept by the State Division of Professional Licensing, whose staff works with federal and local authorities to verify the information on the applications.

Permits to carry concealed weapons are issued by local courts police and sheriff's officers. Many law enforcement agencies in the require fingerprints and then delay issuing the permits in order to run fingerprint checks on the applicants. Such precautions are not required by state law, however.

During the past 12 months, there was a 45 percent increase in permits to carry firearms and a 19 percent increase in applications to purchase firearms, as compared to the previous 12month period, according to records of the Division of Professional Licensing. A total of 33. and 28, 853 purchases made.

Some law enforcemtne agencies have advocated broadening the law to cover all types of firearms. They have also proposed mandatory fingerprinting of persons applying for permits to carry concealed firearms and a waiting period of up to 30 days before the issuance of permits.

Other legislative changes that have been proposed would ban the nurchase or use of firearms by persons who have been convicted of habitual drunkenness or use. possession or sale of narcotics and to persons who have been committed to mental institutions




