The coaching profession is one of the most unstable employment rolls an individual can become involved in.

If the coach produces a winner, he is thought of as a great coach. Let him lose a few seasons and the fans are ready to hang him in effigy. The question of having or not having material doesn't seem to enter into the picture. The professional ranks are the best example.

Ted Williams, one of the greatest baseball players of the modern era, was hired as manager of the Washington Senators, a perineal loser. He'll get a couple of years to produce and if he doesn't, the ax will fall.

Punch Imlach was fired as coach and general manager of the Toronto Maple Leafs only moments after his team lost a fourth straight play-off game to the Boston Bruins. The Imlach era brought four Stanley Cups in 11 seasons and play-off finishes in 10 of those seasons. Many of his players are close to retirement age, but reasoning seems to run second to money in the professional sports.

It's great while your on top, but oh how lonesome it can be while you're down.

Baseball season is upon us again as the majors opened play this week. The American and National Leagues have split into two divisions each this season and Seattle, Montreal, San Diego and Kansas City have been added as ex-

pansion teams. Expansion teams and a pre-world series play-off between divisions will extend the season into mid October. By the end of the baseball season the college football seasons will be half over, pro football teams will have played their exhibition season and seven games of the regular campaign and pro basketball and pro hockey will be underway.

Baseball is fast becoming the long campaign of unexcitable action. A former National League Broadcaster, Red Barber, has written an article worth reading, "Can Baseball be Saved?" The article appears in the April edition of Readers Digest for those interested. Barber discusses 9 ways to improve the game.

It's difficult to find fault with his theory of baseball. Fans don't enjoy the long drawn out, low scoring pitchers duels typical of baseball today.

The station wagon registered to the Interagency Motor Pool and being used by the U.S. Coast Geodetic Survey was a total loss.



Meditation



Flimsy as a


