Lake Creek Sockeye

The run of Sockeye Salmon into Lake Pleasant experienced some difficulty this year, according to Dan Stewart of the Fisheries Department.

The fish ladder originally built to obtain spawning salmon, had been damaged either by vandals or by time and weather. The ladder separation had been removed and the fish could not make their way up the creek. Stewart spent several days repairing the ladder and traps.


