BOMB PRANK Governor to speak in Forks NOT FUNNY A community banquet will

"Unfunny! It's dangerous! It's disruptive!" With these few words, James Traver, high school principal, commented on the recent bomb threat at FHS. Not only did the "prank" create turmoil within the community, it also created a disturbance within the school. This is a serious offense, and if it was an "April Fool's Day" joke it wasn't very funny.

An anonymous phone call to the town marshal sparked the new excitement. The "mad bomber" informed him that a bomb had been planted in the school, set to go off at 9:15 a.m. It was 8:25 a.m. when Mr. Trayer ordered the entire school to be evacuated.

Everyone thought it was another one of those "annoying fire alarms", and they piled out of their classes into the wet, clammy Forks weather. To avoid panic, Mr. Traver did not inform the students until the danger was almost past.

The school was given a thorough shake-down. Three police officers and some maintenance personnel led the search for the bomb. Nothing was found, and after the sheriff had informed Mr. Traver that it was safe to return, the classes were resumed.

In 1948, the Library Association was formed. This was made up of people who wanted a library and also wanted to honor all of those from the community who had fought in World War I, World War II. and later, the Korean War. Funds were raised by popular subscription from individuals and organizations. On July 2, 1951, the new building was started. This was built on a donated lot, with much of the materials being donated. Almost all of the labor was donated.

The new Forks Memorial Library was dedicated on June 28, 1952. At that time the book collection only partly filled the building, but our library has continued to grow and now is full and providing a much needed service to children and adults in our community. As a branch of the Clallam County Library, the Forks library can obtain for you any book in the county collection.

OUR LARGER HOME Children born into today's world are born into a world that is larger and smaller at the same time.
