Apparently there are no ditches in the area of the Leppell home on E Street to carry the water, therefore, the water finds its own way to the County ditch, which unfortunately seems to be across the property owned by Chaney and Ron Shearer. Ron Shearer stated that he would provide enough of his property to allow a ditch to be dug, this should carry the water to the county ditch that runs along Bogachiel Way in Mansfield Addition. This might possibly alleviate the problem which Herb Beebe said has been the same for 35 years.

"But probably Barlows' biggest job is that of the total accountability of logs and the payment for them," said E.C. Gockerell, North Olympic Field Supervisor.

During calendar year 1969 over 230,000,000 bd. ft. of logs was removed from State lands in the Forks district. The value paid to the State was over \$10,568,000. It is Barlow's responsibility to see that all logs removed from State land are accounted and paid for. "The average truck load

of logs is about 3500 to 4500 bd. ft., so we keep tabs on about 55,000 loads of logs yearly, " said Barlow.

Barlow resides near the mouth of the Hoh River with his wife Elizabeth.

"Tree planting on State lands in the Forks area was completed the end of March, reported E.C. Gockerell, North Olympic Area Supervisor for the Department of Natural Resources.

Over 1, 100, 000 trees were planted. Most were 2 year old Douglas fir raised at the Webster Nursery near Olympia from cones collected near Forks. Soleduck and South Fork Hoh.

Johnny Jones, project forest-

er for the Clearwater Honor Camp was in charge of the big project which started mid-November. Inmates from the camp directed by foreman Mary Goldman, Anders Olson, Glen Gwinn and Whitey Halverson did the planting. They planted 3680 acres on 53 separate units. The crews of 7 to 10 men plant the trees with long bladed planting hoes at 12 feet x 12 feet spacing in rows of about 300 trees per acre.

The total cost of the project was \$51,793 or slightly more than \$14 per acre.

during the first year or two root system. Then they seem to explode from the ground.

About 7 years after planting the trees average 15 to 20 feet in height and are thinned and fertilized. These practices further stimulate growth to 4 to 5 feet of height growth

"We are managing our State added Gockerell. "We harvest, plant, thin, fertilize, thin again and then harvest. The big difference is that it takes us longer to do it. We used to talk about a 100 year rotation for forest crops. But on good site land such as we have in Forks, Hoh, Clearwater areas and with careful planting, thinning and fertilizing we can reduce the time between crops to 50 years and maybe even 40 years.'



In this highly computerized age many young people as well as all too many older folks are content to just "push buttons".....

What is all too often overlooked is the fact that there isn't a computer made that would be worth a second thought were it not for the information "fed" to it by highly-trained, technically-skilled, thinking men and women. Make just one, very simple mistake and the whole process of the "machine" can only produce error and failure!!

The same is true in every area of our life. True because God has so ordained it. By God's unchangeable decree man is still important! 


