

MEETING TONITE SEAT BELTS CUT HOSPITAL COSTS

A study recently published by the Cornell Aeronautical Laboratory has shown that seat reduce serious injuries as well according to the Washington

Traffic Safety Commission. The Cornell researchers studied all rural highway crashes occurring in Utah during a one-year period, involving a total of 14,261 drivers and passengers. Throughout the year, Utah state patrolmen completed an additional seat belt investigator's report to provide the data.

Of all those involved in accidents, only 16.5 percent were wearing seat belts. By comparing similar crashes,

it was found that failure to use seat belts increased the chances of instant death or severe inbelts not only save lives, but jury by 100 percent. The study underscored the importance of wearing seat belts to prevent ejection from the vehicle, but found that this benefit accounted for only about one-quarter of the total benefit to seat belt

> The ejected motorist's death risk increased by 3, 000 percent over the occupant who remained inside his vehicle. Ejection rates for non-belted occupants was nine time higher than ejection rates for motorists wearing seat belts.

- roof, hood and trunk.
- 13. All cars shall display a pull-down flag.
- 14. No loose objects in cars.
- 15. Oil bath air cleaners must be emptied of oil. 16. All batteries must be strapped down and can be mounted on floor of car no dual lashups, stock batteries only, no cat or
- 17. No locked rear ends.
- 18. All trailer hitches to be cut off cars, including braces to
- 19. No raised rear ends.
- 20. All hardtops must have a roll bar on the drivers side.
- 21. Fire wall may be cut out to clear engine.
- 22. All cars must have a chemical fire extinguisher next to
- 23. Decisions of the Referee and Judges will be final.
- 24. No liquor in the pits before, after or during the event. Any driver found drinking will be automatically disqualified
- with his car and pitman. 25. Cars will enter the area and circle in a clockwise manner until flag is dropped and the siren is sounded signaling the
- start of race. 26. Hitting a car on the driver's door results in an automatic disqualification.
- 27. After a car has not moved, or been dead for two minutes, the flag must be lowered.
- 28. Cars having their flags down must not be hit by other cars.
- 29. Drivers must remain in their cars until end of event.
- 30. No one can work on cars until after 3rd heat.
- 31. Only driver and pitman and sponsor can be in pits. 32. Powder Puff Race will have the same rules.

Having viewed the attitude and respect, or lack thereof, of our citizenry toward our American Flag, he was prompted to write this article, in which the flag is talking to us as the embodiment of Uncle Sam.

But what ever they call me, I am your flag, or as I proudly state, the flag of the United States of America. I remember some time ago, I think it was Memorial Day. People were lined up on both sides of the street to watch the parade. The town's high school band was in back of me and naturally I was leading the parade. When your daddy saw me coming along waving in the breeze, he immediately removed his hat and placed it against his left shoulder so that his hand was directly over his heart. Remember?

And you, I remember you. Standing there as straight as a soldier, you didn't have any hat but you were giving the right salute. They taught you in school to place your hand over your heart. WSU PRESIDENT SAYS, NO

> Washington State University President Glenn Terrell has answered 11 demands made by six campus groups calling themselves "Third World" organizations.

In six cases the president said "no" or explained why the requests were beyond the authority of the university to act. To four other demands le said that the university has been working toward a solution. In the case of removing all 'non-union grapes" from the campus, Terrell said no grapes lave been purchased since last fall.

Terrell said "no" to demands that the university immediate. ly disarm campus police, eliminate all plainclothes and undercover agents, abolish the discipline board and conduct a 10-day racism workshop mandatory for all faculty and

He voted two proposals dealing with a Third World review board and the rights of Third World people to be tried by their "peers", but agreed to convene the Human Relations Committee to examine what can be done further to fight racism through student publications and student organiza-

tions.

The president said the university already is doing something about recruiting minority students and has tried to keep some faculty members in the Black Studies Program who have announced they are leaving WSU.

After answering the demands in a prepared statement three pages in length, Dr. Terrell closed with a "challenge to the groups issuing the 'musts' and to the entire university community: "We must redouble our efforts to find solutions to problems of racial discrimination. We must use reason, dia logue, and appropriate action. Ricial violence and racial inequities will not be solved by countering threats of violence. The University is not a place where solutions should be sough in an atmosphere of confronta-



The total value bid for the six sales was \$598, 208.60.

Peninsula Plywood Corporation of Port Angeles was the successful bidder on three sales, Rocky Road, Dead Beaver Leave and Under the Thumb. The Rocky Road sale, consisting of 3,800,000 board feet, was purchased for \$228, 400.00. They will be required to perform restoration work on 3.9 miles of Road #303, 2.8 miles of Road #2971, and 2.8 miles of Road #2971B.

The Dead Beaver Leave sale, has a total volume of 5, 100, -000 board feet and was purchased for \$275, 875.00. This is a Small Business Set Aside

The Under the Thum's sale consisting of 650, 000 board feet was purchased for \$23, -850.00. This sale is a part of the Forest Service's accelerated program of salvage in this area. ture.

The Bear Creek Pass Salvage sale, purchased by Publishers Forest Products Company of Anacortes, Washington, consists of 500,000 board feet and sold for \$26 960.00. There is no exemption from Domestic Manufacture on the above four sales.

Seaboard Lumber Company purchased the Middle Creek Intermediate sale, consisting of 4,000,000 board feet, for \$ 41,680.00. They will be required to construct 0.6 mile of road to log the sale. There is no restrictions on manufacture.

The Kugel Flat Thinning, consisting of 610,000 board feet, was purchased by George Sparks for \$1,443.60. There is no restriction on manufac-



Hoh: Hoh river from markers set near upper mouth of Nolan Creek downstream to reservation boundary, July 1 through November 30. Weekly closures midnight Friday to midnight Sunday, July 1 through September 30. Quillayute: Quillayute river from fishing markers approximately 200 yards below mouth of Sol Duc river to National Park boundary, September 1 through November 30. Off-reservation Indian ceremonial and personal use fishing will be permitted under closely controlled conditions which include a ban against sale of the fish and in the case of ceremonial fishing, written permission from the Director of
