




The accident occurred as the spun around, hitting a telesanderson venicle was southbound on 101 and the Taylor vehicle pulled into the path of the truck.

#### EDITORIAL

The inequities in our present welfare system have come under fire by several groups of late. Those who feel they aren't being paid enough and those who are tired of paying.

At the annual convention of Washington Newspaper Publishers Association convention held at Yakima, September 12, Governor Evans included in his speech the following statement. He said, "How about public assistance? Here's an area where everyone likes to jump aboard, and everybody's got a simple example of some chiseler down the block who is on public assistance that should not be, and sure, when we have as many thousands of people as we have who are drawing public assistance, there's always room for cheating: just as there is always room for cheating and we probably have just as good an example of someone cheating on their income tax or someone consistently flaunting the law when they are out on the highway." The governor went on to say that he felt the majority of people on public assistance do not really like to receive aid but just why they continue to do so, he did not say.

Governor Evans said, the state pays about \$70 per month to the aged and about \$190 to a family of four, the average size family receiving aid to dependent children.

We know of families that have been on welfare for generations. We know of those who continue to have children, just to increase their monthly allorment. We know of those who should not receive it, but we also know of some who should.

We have a family in our town, a young family, that had healthy children, until one day the young girl was taken to the hospital, she underwent surgery that saved her life, but the hospital bills and drug bills began to mount. The father works in the woods, he earns enough to care for his family, but occassionally the woods are closed, the bills continue to come in. The family must buy medicine for the child if she is to live. They received aid for awhile, then the help stopped. The father, a proud man says, "Let them keep their money, we don't neet it". Although with the woods closed, it is sometimes very difficult financially for him to write the check for \$143.00 each month to pay for the medicine. The young girl is in a special school for the blind in Vancouver, Washington, but the medicine still must be sent each month, it is all that keeps their daughter

Why the state will not help a family like this one and yet will support the known welfare offender is very difficult to understand. Hundreds of thousands of dollars are spent trying to train the illiterate for new jobs, jobs they invariably to not hold for any time at all. Perhaps the guaranteed annual wage isn't so bad after all, I wonder where you apply?
