

LETTERS TO THE EDITOR.

For awhile, the public is going to lean backwards over environmental problems, real or fancied.

Now it seems the State Forestry Department (D. N. R.) policies, just as they are becoming the soundest ever, are becoming the subject of scrutingy, largely in regard to burning of wastage.

Just now, I am going back to the old days of selective logging, when some ripe trees were cut and a seed tree left standing.

Near here, on the Upper Hoh, there is still an old seed tree standing. In its vicinity are logs with only the first cut removed. A number of bushy spruce trees are in the open; many straggly ones, crowded about with alders, and vinemaple abounds.

In other areas stand a second growth of hemlock so crowded that if allowed to remain, would take years to evolve into anything useable. In the survival effort, such trees keep getting taller and skinnier til a heavy snow may result in a complete lean-down, or shall we say snow-down; or perhaps a few stout ones will sur-

It is desirable that trees growing stand close enough together to shade out lower limbs and produce a tall smooth trunk, but far enough apart to enable the individuals to gain substance if they are to be peel ers or make straight and strong lumber. Trees that stand too close together may keep up the battle of the survival of the fittest for many decades.

Under management, they are generally thinned and de-lim-

Most state lands go through a salvaging process before burning, after the main cutting.

If, however, there is insufficient debris on the ground. a dense seeding of undesirable sorts will remain in the soil, producing hemlock thickets, and vegatation crowding out replanting efforts. In reseeding by air, much seed will fall on barren places such as logs and brush piles.

Therefore, it is desirable to burn as cleanly as possible and plant seedlings at such intervals as will permit them to they will stretch up straight and tall and clean stemmed in the effort to reach the sunlight, without crowding.

Personally, I would like to see belts of unflammable varieties to keep fire from tearing through the pitchy sorts, but perhaps chemicals will solve that. New Seat Belts Control Auto Ignition System

A new type of auto seat belt—especially for the six out of 10 American motorists who do not use this safety aid now-

The device, called the "Auto-Safe" interlock belt, utilizes electronically wired belts. Unless they are buckled properly, the car's engine cannot be started.

The working parts of the device, developed by Irvin Industries of Greenwich, Conn., consist of pressure switches in each buckle and a special sensing switch in the driver's buckle. The sensing switch works only if the belt is around the driver and its mercury connector is at the proper angle.

Small sensors inside the seat cushions are also activated when a passenger sits down. If the seat belts in all occupied positions are not fastened, the ignition will not start.

A dashboard light and audio signal are activated if a seat belt is unfastened after the car is started, and these remain activated until the belt is refastened.

The National Safety Council revealed that between 8,000 and 10,000 lives could have been saved last year if people wore their seat belts, and that from 2,700 to 3,000 lives were saved during 1969 because auto occupants involved in accidents were wearing seat belts.





ing tragedies were a result of careless driving. It is the responsibility of every motorist to eliminate these errors. We can and must do a better job

out on the highway." Speed and failure to grant the right-of-way were the leading driver failures contributing to July's fatal collisions. Traveling at excessive speed or too fast for conditions contributed to 22 fatal collisions. Failure to yield the right-of-way resulted in 18 mishaps. Improper passing, corssing over the center line and disregarding traffice signs or signals led to 15 fatal crashes.

Thirty-seven persons killed were drivers, 36 were passengers, 4 were pedestrians, 3 were riding bicycles, two were driving motorcycles and one person fell from a moving vehicle.

Representative Paul Conner has urged that the State Toll Bridge Authority acquire the privately-operated Port Townsend to Keystone (Whidbey Island) ferry route.

In a letter to Governor Daniel J. Evans, chairman of the toll bridge authority, the 24th District legislator said the Olympic Ferries may soon go out of business because of severe financial losses.

"This is to appeal to the Toll Bridge Authority to add this route to the state ferry system, "Conner said. "It seems unfair that a private company should be forced to continaully take severe losses on a route that properly should

H. J. Carroll, Olympic Ferries Secretary-treasurer, recreation areas said the company will go out of business in the event that the State Utilities and Transportation Commission denies a request for elimination of its frun from October 16 to April 15 of next year.

"If the schedule change is not approved, "Carroll said, "we will be forced to surrender our certificate at the end of the summer season, September 7. "

A spokesman for the Utilitie and Transportation Commission estimated that Olympic Ferries lost some \$45,000 last year, and commented, "I can't understand how they could operate for six months out of the year and make money either. "

In applying to the Utilities and Transportation Commission for the October-April run cancellation, Carroll suggested that the commission contact the Toll Bridge Authority "to see if the state can offer better service" than the proposed schedule will afford.

KNOW YOUR SAFETY HELMETS

Some safety helmets, designed and sold for use by sports car enthusiasts and motorcyclists, do not provide adequate protection for the user, according to Clifford E. Aden, director of the Washington Traffic Safety Commission.

"We have been notified by the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) that it has received reports indicating certain helmets are so fragile that they shatter on the slightest impact. The hazard is particularly great for users who purchase a safety helmet which performs well at first, but then may unpredictably develop serious faults and offer no protection in the event of a highway crash.

Helmet users should know of what material his headgear is made and should use only paints and cleaning solvents which are certified by the manufacturer as compatible with the material. Using the wrong paint or solvent can damage and weaken the hel-

"Purchasers will obtain an extra measure of safety by buying only those helmets which carry a label-certification that the product has met the Z90.1-1966 standard. This is a selfimposed standard set by the industry's American National Standards Institute.

The NHTSA is conducting a testing program to identify those helmets which may not provide adequate protection. In addition, a federal standard on' protective headgear is being readied for adoption.


GIRL SCOUT NEWS



THE GOLDEN EAGLE PROGRAM

The Golden Eagle is a wallet-size card providing yearlong access to designated Federal recreation areas throughout the nation where entrance fees are charged under the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act. The annual permit, or "Golden Eagle Passport," sells for \$10. When signed by the owner, it is valid from January 1, 1971 to December 31, 1971.

The Golden Eagle Passport admits the purchaser and all persons accompanying him in one private noncommercial vehicle to designated recreation areas and permits use of most day use facilities and services.

The Golden Eagle Passport can be purchased at some entrances to Federal recreation areas, at offices of the Federal agencies honoring the passport, and at county offices of the Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service throughout the nation. Many department stores and sporting goods stores also offer the Eagle.

In addition to the Golden Eagle, fees are also charged for special facilities and services, including well developed campgrounds, guide service, etc. Here in the Olympic National Park we find the following fees for this season. \$1.00 per day in the following: Dosewallips Campground, Graves Creek Campground, Staircase Campground, Altaire Campground, and Elwah Campground. \$2.00 per day in the following: Fairholm Campground, Heart

O'the Hills Campground, Hoh Campground, Kalaloch Campground, Mora Campground, and Soleduck Camp-REVENUE USE

The revenues in the Land and Water Conservation Fund are earmarked by law for outdoor recreation. As appropriated by Congress, revenues from sales of \$10 Golden Eagle Passports, short-term permits, and other fees, plus other income to the fund, are used to purchase certain federal recreation areas; or are apportioned to the states, and through the states to local communities, where they are matched by state or local funds to provide near-to-home outdoor recreation.


