


#### **Donald Carte** receives award

# Beaches closed to

clam digging All ocean beaches south of the Moclips River will be closed to razor clam digging after midnight June 7 due to a rapid decrease in size of clams being dug and an increase in clam wastage, the Department of Fisheries announced today. The closure will affect Long Beach, Twin Harbors Beach, Copalis Beach and Mocrocks, Fisheries Director Thor C. Tollefson said. The Kalaloch area in the Olympic National Park remains open until the originally scheduled closing date July 16.

Tollefson said constant monitoring and sampling by Department biologists revealed an alarming decrease in the average size of clams being

FROM THE BOGACHIEL REARING POND: The Washington State Department of Game has completed their annual steelhead release activities for the season. Bogachiel Rearing Pond Superintendent Steve Miller recently released the following figures pertaining to the rearing and release program. Young steelhead averaging 6 to 9 inches were released as follows: Hoh, 22,455; Bogachiel, 50,220; Calawah, 25,284; Elwah, 20,190; Clallam, 10,139; Pysht, 16,233; Dungeness, 17,688; Lyre, 28,420; and Big Quilicene, 10,360. In addition, 10,000. steelhead from the Aberdeen Hatchery were released into the upper Bogachiel. This is an attempt to get a better return of fish above the rearing pond into the upper stretches of this ever-

popular winter steelhead stream. NEWS FROM THE O. N. P.: Roger W. Allen, Superintendent of the Olympic National Park, announced that the Deer Park Campground is still not accessible because of snow. Altaire and Olympic Hot Springs Campgrounds will not be usable until the Soldier's Bridge is reconstructed across the Elwha River. There will be an extensive refurbishing of the park's campgrounds and picnic areas through the early spring and summer. Crews will be going around the park painting and fixing the facilities and, in some cases, there may be a restroom or picnic table being renovated causing momentary inconvenience to a park visitor. Park personnel are looking forward to a

variety of summer activities aimed at increasing the enjoyment of the many park visitors. CAUTION IN THE BACK COUNTRY: With the recent warm weather and sunny days many bikers will take to the Olympic back country. Superintendent Roger Allin reminds those planning trips into the back country of the park that with the arrival of warm days many of the park's rivers will be high with fast, icy water and caution should be used by those contemplating fording these rivers.

#### New shellfish regulations

New shellfish regulations adopted today by the Department of Fisheries will change the limit and digging hours for Flat Point true west to Shaw razor clams in 1973 and set immediately provisions for harvesting sea urchins, sea

cucumbers and octopus. Effective January 1, 1973, the daily bag limit for razor clams will be reduced to 15; the limit for the rest of this year remains at 18.

The following digging hours will take effect January 1, 1973: October 1- March 15 -Open daily 24 hours, March 16-June 30 - Open daily midnight to noon, July, August and September - closed.

Effective immediately, sea urchins and sea cucumbers are classified as shellfish and may be taken for personal use by hand or hand-operated intrument which does not penetrate the animal. Eob Koch, Assistant Director Ask prospective employers for Driver Services of the Department of Motor Vehicles, says that the DMV Director has the legal right and responsibility to suspend driving privileges for falsification of a license or for using a phony driver license. This extends to those who have never had a legal license to drive a car. The practice is most common among those who are

under 21 years of age and need a form of I.D. which will permit them to drink in bars. After they have been detected and driving rights suspended, the state law requires that they file an S.R. 22 (Certificate of Financial Responsibility) before the license is issued. This can cost additional premiums amounting to between 50% and 100%. To a person under

Gillnets are required to have 6, 1/2-inch minimum mesh and only chinook salmon may be taken until June 15. Chinook less than 26 inches long may be retained for personal use only. This special fishery was established at the request of the Makah Tribal Council and U. S. Burcan of Indian Affairs in recognition of treaty fishing rights, Fisheries Director Thor C. Tollefson said.







Illegal to turn back mileage

As everyone knows, it is illegal to turn back the mileage indicator (odometer) on cars, and effective May 23rd new legislation takes effect which requires the owner of an automobile beir g sold to inscribe in ink on the title certificate the miles indicated on the car. Jack Nelson, Director of the Department of Motor Vehicles, said that it is a further step in protecting the

consumer from those auto dealers who roll inileage back on a car before they offer it In those instances where the title to the car is in the hands of the lien holder, the dealer will be required to log the mileage of the car on forms provided by the Department of Motor Vehicles. Unless

the mileage is on the old title or on the form mentioned above, County Auditors and their agents will reject the title. With the implementation of the new legislation, backed strongly by the New and Used Car Dealers Associations, it will be easier for the buyer to learn the true mileage of a car and more difficult for the odometer to be turned back without de-

At a meeting with the investigative staff of the Dealer Division of the Department of Motor Vehicles, called to explain the new law, Boo Hayter, Administrator, said; "We are not out to get anybody. But we are out to protect the public from the dishonest dealer." The practice of odometer

rollback, co.nmoneplace prior to dealer-backed legislation passed in 1969, and still prevalent among some auto dealers, can greatly enhance the apparent value of a car. For example, a 1971 Chevrolet with 70,000 miles on it has a May, 1972 "blue book " penalty on it of \$1,100.00. A dishonest dealer taking such a car in trade, need only roll the odometer back under 15,000 miles to pick up that \$1,100.00 from the next


