On September 10, 1972, a cutover from the present level of distribution voltage to a higher level on a line e tending south from Forks on Highway 101 will mark the concluding step of the District's phase one program of system improvements in the Forks service area. Just over a year ago, engineering studies indicated that the projected increase in the number of customers, along with the increase in use of electricity by our existing customers, would soon necessitate improved service facilities to meet our customer's electrical needs. The system south along Highway 101 was of special concern since the line extends to the Clearwater Honor Camp and to the lower Hoh. Increasing industrial use of this line has also contributed to the need for service improvement. A step-up of the distribution voltage will enable greater industrial use of the line along with an improved level of service to

our residential customers. The key factor in improvement of service was the installation of a new substation at Forks. On September 5, Russell Bayton, President of the Board of Commissioners of Clallam County P. U. D., with one operation of a high

lators. 10,000 KVA transformer in background. voltage switch, energized the new station. The new station of 10,000 KVA capacity will be used primarily to serve the line extending south on Highway 101. The use of the station will relieve the load on the existing transformer, thus providing increased capacity for the town proper. The new station has a total cost, including transformers,

regulators, grounding mats,

switching and metering, of \$166,000.00. Since the Forks Substation is some distance away from the Bonneville Power Administration's source at Port Angeles, the District has installed an automatic voltage control device. A sensing unit has been installed on the 120 volt side of our transformers. When the voltage drops below a determined level, a device automatically is energized which raises the voltage. Likewise, when load drops off and the voltage raises, the sensing

voltage. Construction of a new warehouse and modification of the District's storage yard completes phase one improvements. The cost of these improvements totals nearly one-quarter of a million dollars.

The District experiences, as do all utilities, nearly a year's time in the delivery of substation equipment. This time period necessitates the immediate undertaking of system improvements which will be in effect in a year's time. 
