





"In publishing the two editions," the Secretary said, "the office cut down on the use of color within the book and printed to a pamphlets on regular newsprint. This resulted in a saving of some \$60,000 in publishing costs."

The Secretary emphasized that voters can take the pamphlet into the voting booth with use the check list index provided on page three of the book-
