July this year, the second week of January or the third week of July, 1974. Trainees in the practice must be employed by and under the direction and super vision of a licensed or provisionally licensed hearing aid fitter/dispenser and are required to be licensed as well, although no test is required. The fee for the trainee license, which is good for one year from the date of issue, is \$25.00. Those with out-of-state license must pass the state exams before they cna be licensed. Reciprocity with other states is provided for in the law but to date no

such agreements have been negotiated. An advisory council of seven members is being set up and among its duties will be the preparation of examinations for approval of the Professional Licensing Division. The council, appointed by the governor, will consist of four licensed fitter/dispensers, one MD specialist in otolaryngology a clinical audiologist and a public member. All currently active hearing aid fitter/dispensers will be mailed a copy of the new state law, all necessary application forms and the regulations related to it on or about June ist.



Ground breaking has started for the Forks Prarie Mart located just south of Forks on Highway 101. Warren Paul of Paul's Serve-U and part owner of the new supermarket, predicts the store will be the most modern and complete on the Olympic Peninsula "providing the people of the west end with a family shopping center under one roof. A wide selection in grocery, meat and produce will be offered as well as many hardware and variety lines all at very competitive prices." Scheduled to open October 1st, the store will have 20,000 square feet of floor space compared with 2,800 at the present location in downtown Forks. Planning for the store has taken seven months of hard work for Mr. Paul and his stockholders, Bob Green, owner of the 88¢ Store in Port Angeles and Mike Phillips who is associated with "Thriftway Store in Port Angeles. They saw the necessity for a larger market many months ago as the "present store will no longer serve our present customers or potential customers." The new location offers a parking lot large enough to hold 100 cars and easy-off, easy-on access to the highway, thus eliminating the per-

plexing problem of parking as it now exists in downtown Forks. Features of the store include a fine wine section with four feet of cold wine and a complete bread and pastry department. Five standing freezer shelves will display every kind of frozen food imaginable. Plans for a gourmet and foreign food section are under consideration. The produce department will be greatly expanded, featuring fresh vegetables and fruits "in and out of season." The Forks Prarie Mart will be affiliated with Associated Grocers of Seattle who are well-known for handling the highest quality produce and mear.

Highlight of the store will be a total of 7,000 square feet of general, non-grocery merchandise. In Mr. Phillips opinion, this non-food section will be the largest of its kind to be found in any Washington town the size of

Presently employing twelve full and part-time persons, Mr. Paul estimated that the total number of employees should increase to include twenty-five with a store policy of "service plus" to the customer. But service plus is not a new concept to the Serve-U people. Warren Paul and his father, Bert Paul, came to Forks in 1952 and bought the old Forks Grocery on the site of the present Serve-U. Half of the new building was built in 1956 and remodeled in 1966. Mr. Paul says he has enjoyed Forks as "the people have been friendly and nice to do business with. "

"The owners of the Forks Prarie Mart hope to make the transition from the present location to the new location with as little inconvenience to our customers as possible."

Mr. Tom Mansfield is owner of the location and expects several other businesses to move to this area. The onestop family shopping center concept has been popular all over the United States and it should prove as popular here in Forks.
