> Many look forward to the 4th of July Smoker as something new and exciting and different in the year.

Smokers are nothing new here, however. Check this article from the Sept. 8, 1938 issue of the Forks Forum: "TWO FIGHTERS INJURED

AT LAST SMOKER.... A crowd of over 200 persons attended the American Legion-Recreation Council sponsored boxing bouts at the Legion hall last Sunday night and went away talking about the clever style of the smallest chap on the card and the power in the right hand of the heaviest scrapper on the card, intermingled with comments on the

pleasing bouts as a whole. The smallest chap was Benny Wiley, 56 lbs., who tangled with Gerald Rhodes, 58 lbs., and what a scrap they put up! Rhodes, a clever and willing fighter himself, did his best but couldn't dodge enough of Wiley's swinging and never ceasing fists, and as a result Wiley's boring-in tactics gave

him a well-earned decision. The pleasing "heavy" on the card was "Duke" Streeter, who took the decision from Arnold Brown in another fast and close scrap. From the middle of the first round on, Duke depended entirely on his husky right mitt and used it to squelch any advances on Brown's part, at times even winding his arm up three or four times before letting fly with it. Brown seemed pretty wary of that right from the beginning of the second round on, and no wonder -- after the fight it was discovered that Streeter's right had cracked Brown's left

ear drum, rendering that ear totally deaf and quite painful. Two other casualties were also among the results of the bouts, one being the technical victory of Gene Rhodes over Kenny Taylor when Taylor developed a strenuous case of heartburn during the second round and couldn't come out for the third.

The other bout to be stopped was a technical victory for Lorrie Kinsman over Wayne Brumble when Lorrie opened a two-inch cut over Wayne's left eye just as the second round ended. It was a nasty gash necessitating several stitches. Up to then the fight was evenly matched, and both boys have agreed to a return match on the next Smoker.

Auto theft moving to small towns

Always considered a big city crime in the past, auto theft is one the decrease in major population centers and a new trend, increases in small communities, has appeared.

The 1972 Uniform Crime preliminary report, recently issued by the Federal Bureau of Investigation, revealed seven percent reduction in countrywide auto theft over the prior year. This is the first such reduction in over a decade.

The dramatic auto theft reduction in the nation's largest cities is the major contributing factor in the large overall decrease. In cities with a population between 500, 000 and one million, auto thefts in 1972 were down 11 percent and in cities with over a million inhabitants, these thefts dropped by 14 per-

According to the FBI report, cities and towns in all population groups above 10,000 experienced auto theft decreases last year. The only exceptions were communities with fewer than 10,000 residents. THE PROT CHINE INVENTOR OF THE PROTECTION OF THE


The cost of picking up litter along the right of way of the State Highway system is expected to increase about 10 percent this year.







The new policy will place an advance sign one half-mile prior to an intersection, showing name of area and facilities available, and a direc-

NEW PARK REGULATIONS

A nationwide regulation for National Park Service areas was announced in Washington on April 23 according to Superintendent, Roger W. Allin, Olympic National Park. The regulation prohibits motor vehicles with detachable side mirrors projecting more than 6" beyond the side fender line from operat ing within a park area except when the motor vehicle is towing a second

Mr. Allin stated the purpose of this regulation

is to prevent possible injury resulting from a pedestrian being struck by an extended side mirror when the vehicle is in motion. There has also been instances of campers walking into these extended mirrors in the campgrounds especially after dark. While there is a possibility that a pedestrian could be struck by a projecting side mirror when the vehicle is towing another vehicle, the pedestrian at least has a chance to see what is being towed and can be prepared for any evasive action he need take.
