

### PARKS VISITS DECREASE

Assistant Superintendent Reed Jarvis of Olympic National Park announced today that the park's travel figures for the month of June show a 14.7\$ decrease below the same month in 1972. During June, 1972, 334,041 visits were recorded as compared to 284,783 visits in June 1973. The total number of visits for the first half of the year 1973 show a decrease of 4.8% as compared to a similiar

period in 1972. Although it is difficul to determine the actual cause for the decrease, speculation is that a combination of factors such as the reputed gasoline shortage and uncertainty over the economy might reduce the numbers of people who were contemplating a park visit. Mr. Bedford Esters, Manager of Lake Crescent Lodge, indicated cancellations as a result of the concern over the shortage of gasoline. were on vacation in Hawaii. \* \* \* \* \* \* \* On June 23rd, Mr. and Mrs. Art Munson flew to Ketchikan, Alaska, where they were joined by their daughter, Linda and her son Lance and embarked on a trip to retrace a part of Alaska's history and it's Gold Rush days. Traveling from Ketchikan, they

took the Malaspina ferry with stops at Haines and Juneau, arriving at their destination at Skagway. In 1898, Mrs. Harriet Pullen (Mrs. Pullen's aunt) and ner three children set off

from Seattle by boat along with Mrs. Pullen's horses. Landing in Skagway was quite a chore in itself as there was no deck and the Pullen's and the norses had to swim ashore. Mrs. Pullen later built a hotel in Skagway and played a very important part in Skagway's and the Gold Rush history. Mrs. Pullen died in Skagway in 1947 and is buried across the railroad tracks from her hotel. Many of her Alaskan artifacts are on display at the Civic

Auditorium in Scattle. The Department of Interior plans to re-do the Skagway main to depict its bustling days when its population was 20,000 It now has a population of 750. 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




