FORKS CHAMBER OF COMMERCE SUPPORTS SEWER PROJECT

The Forks Chamber of Commerce, being vitally interested in the welfare and orderly development of the Greater Forks Area, hereby goes on record as favoring the proposed Sewer Project. The Forks Chamber of Commerce believes the Sewer Project is a priority requirement, necessary to meet the rapid expansion we have had and will continue to experience in our community.

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Among those factors favoring the Sewer Project, we believe protection of the City's water supply to be most important. The City's water supply can not be allowed to be endangered by pollution from septic tank and drain field run-off. Public Health officials cannot predict an exact time that our water supply will become polluted; however, they can tell us we are approaching a time when we should be concerned

We believe the time to act is NOW, not later. We would encourage all citizens affected by the Sewer Project to study the sewer proposal carefully before deciding whether they favor or oppose the proposal, always keeping in mind the welfare of the entire community.

Kate Shearer, longtime resident in the area, died July 14th in Forks. Mrs. Shearer was born in 1894 in Gold Hill, Oregon to the Thomas Pankeys. She spent her early years in Oregon until she married Daniel Shearer in 1914. Immediately after their marriage they came to Forks where Mr. Shearer was engaged in construction. Mrs. Shearer was Postmistress during World War I and Justice of the Peace in the 1950's. She held membership in the Eastern Star and Rebekah Lodges, the Clallam County Park Board, Forks Cemetery Board and the Washington State Safety Council. She was active in the ladies aid to the Congregational Church and was instrumental in the beginnings of the Community Library.

Services were held in the Congregational Church and interment was in the Forks Cemetary. Surviving are three brothers, Joseph Pankey of White City. Oregon; Earl Pankey of Jacksonville, Oregon and Theron Pankey of Phoenix, Oregon. Her two sons are Theron Reed Shearer and Ronald Shearer, both of Forks.

Basic educational

opportunity

grants

Students who need money for their education after high school may now apply for Basic Educational Opportunity Grants, Congresswoman Julia Butler Hansen, D. -Wash. reported.

More than \$122 million is available under this new program being administered by the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare's

Office of Education. Although limited this year to first-year, full time postsecondary students, the program is expected to benefit an estimated one-half million students who might otherwise be unable to continue their education, Rep. Hansen

explained. "Along with other federal programs of student financial aid, it marks progress toward the ultimate goal of making postsecondary education available to all young people who deall young people who de-tension services, and ralent Search. Unward

Under the Basic Grant program, students in financial need may obtain funds to help pay their educational expenses at any approved college, university, vocational school, technical institute, or hospital school of nursing. How much a student or his family can contribute affects the amount of his basic grant and is determined according to a formula established by the U.S. Office of Education. To apply for a Basic Grant, an Application for Determination of Expected Family Contribution" must be obtained, filled out and mailed to P.O. Box b, Iowa City, Iowa 52240. Within a month the student is notified of the amount of his

family's expected contribution. He then submits the notification to the school of his choice, which calculates the amount of the Basic Grant to which he is

entitled. Application forms are now available at student financial aid offices at postsecondary institutions, high school guidance offices, post offices, state employment offices, county agricultural ex-

Bound, and Student Special Services projects. If unavailable in the area where the student resides, he can write to Box G, Iowa City, Iowa 52240. Other forms of federal student assistance such as Supplemental Education Opportunity Grants, College Work-Study, National Direct Student Loans, and Guaranteed Student Loans are available in addition to

Change In Social

Security Law

A recent change in the Social Security law provides that ex-servicemen receiving Social Security benefits may have their benefits recalculated to include gratuitous military service wage credits for active service after 1956, according to Tom Deeney, Social Security Branch manager in Port Angeles.

"Servicemen will receive wage credits of 300 dollars for each calendar quarter that they were in active service after 1956, Deeney said. "In many cases the additional credits will result in a higher Social Security benefit." There is no requirement for length of service, One day of active duty or active

RECREATIONAL DEVELOPEMENTS "Access to the outstanding BY DNR IN TROUBLE

"Outdoor recreation development by the Department of Natural Resources in Washington is in serious trouble," says Bert Cole, Commissioner of Public Lands. The DNR, which has already built more than 130 outdoor recreational camps and picnic areas in the state, has been forced to halt plans on two recreation projects on Whidbey Island and San Juan Island, and

several others are threatened. DNR has been denied shoreline management permits by the respective County Commissioners. The permits have been denied because of objections from neighboring landowners. One of the developments is at Useless Bay, on the west side of Whidbey Island. Land has been purchased, plans made, and money appropriated to construct outdoor recreation facilities and to develop an access route to 235 acres of publicly-owned tidelands. The denial of a shoreline management construction permit by Island County Commissioners means this beach will remain unavail-

able to the public. The other project is at Cattle Point on the south end of San Juan Island; it has been denied a permit by the San Juan County Commissioners. This site would have provided public recreation access to over two miles of beach. Other DNR projects that

are threatened include Center Island Boaters' camp, a proposed destination camp for boaters that would be located just east of Lopez Island. The camp would serve as a base from which recreationists could reach hundreds of miles of publicly-owned tidelands by boat. This project will be before the San Juan County Commissioners for approval next year. The public's interest in developing outdoor recreation sites was clearly expressed last November, when voters approved Referendum 28 and authorized \$40,000,000 for such recreation projects.

Private landowners adjacent to the sites, however, insist

that public access would ruin the pastoral, residential nature of their land, and would increase vandalism. fires and trespassing on

private property. Commissioner Cole stated recreational resources of Puget Sound and the San Juan Islands must not be limited to a privileged few, as has happened on comparable areas in many other states." He suggested that Washington's outdoor recreationists, sportsmen, and boaters write to the County Commissioners of Island and San Juan Counties and their local County Commissioners expressing their desire to enjoy these public lands that are now unavailable for their
