

Library turned over to Town of Forks

The Forks Town Council met
August 13 at 7:30 p.m. in City
Hall. Present were Mayor Earl
Kennedy, councilmen Frank Smiley
Joe Winney, Marge Howard and
Fred Cline, Judge Herb Beebe
and Marshal Ken Bryson and Tony

Many library representatives
were in attendance as Boyd Rupp,
president of the Forks Memorial
Library Association, officially turned the library over to the Town
of Forks. Representing the library
were Mr. Jim Kirks, director of
the North Olympic Library System;
Mr. Lyle Strombaugh of Sequim,
trustee; Miss Primrose Bredl;
retired director Miss Hodges; Leroy Malmsten, treasurer; board
members Mrs. Arthur Stanley,
Elsie Mottler, Lu Marsh and
Mrs. Leroy Malmsten; and Mr.
and Mrs. Arthur Maxfield who

Mr. Rupp said the library is part of the North Olympic Library System which encompasses all of Clallam County, and recommended that the council appoint a Library Board representative of not only the Town of Forks but outlying areas as well. The Board would act in an advisory capacity only.

Mr. Kirks stated he realized
Forks was growing and that there
could be access to more materials
if there was a larger facility;
however, there is not much
room for expansion at the present library site. Other than providing books, Mr. Kirks said
the new trend in libraries is
to provide a variety of media:
8 and 16 mm films, cassettes
and cassette players for the
handicapped and shut-ins, and recordings.

D. J. Caulkins aunounced that

the road by his shop which was vacated is now ready for inspection.

Bert Maris informed the Council that the gauge installed in the Bogachiel River for the purpose of recording water temperatures had been taken. It was suggested that another gauge be installed near the Fish Hatchery so it could be watched more closely, a plan which Steven Miller of the Dept. of Game approved. Mayor Kennedy suggested, however, that the engineers be contacted for permission to relocate the gauge.

The Council passed Taxi Service Ordinance #143 which was drawn up for Mr. B.F. Sageser who operates a taxi service in Forks. The license fee was set at \$10 per year.

The Council received a traffic count taken by the Highway Dept. at three intersections in Forks: 101 and Division, 101 and "B" Street, and 101 and Calawah Way. The Highway Dept. will meet with the Council August 29 in regard to the possibility of installing a traffic light.

Correspondence from Lee

Johnson & Associates stated that the treatment plant for the proposed Forks sewer system may be relocated due to objections from people in that area. Also the original seven sewer districts have been combined into five districts.

Marshal Bryson said the problem wasn't getting any better even

NATIONAL PARK PREPARING TO BITE AGAIN

Public hearings on the wilderness study and the proposed master
plan for the Olympic National
Park will be held in Aberdeen
and Port Angeles in early November, Congresswoman Julia Butler Hansen, D., Wash., reported today.

The study has been prepared in accordance with the Wilder ness Act of 1964, Rep. Hansen said. This act requires the Sectary of the Interior to review roadless areas in the National Park System to determine their suitability for inclusion in the National Wilderness Preservation

Rep. Hansen said a public hearing will be held Nov. 1 in the Courtesy Room, Aberdeen, and on Nov. 3 in the Little Theater, Peninsula College, Port Angeles. The hearings will begin at 9:30 a.m. in Aberdeen and 9 a.m. at Port Angeles.

Persons wishing to make com-

Persons wishing to make comments on the proposed master plan for the Olympic National Park may do so at a hearing Oct. 31 at 9:30 a.m. in Aberdeen and Nov. 2 at 9 a.m. ir Port Angeles. These sessions will be at the locations for the public hearings.

Interior Department studies show the existing road system and the detachment of the coastal area from the main part of the park divides the park into four roadless areas, each exceeding 5,000 acres. In total the roadless areas comprise about 870,200 acres of the parks total 896,599 acres.

The Olympic Wilderness lies

mainly in one large central roadless area of some 823,100 acres. It encompasses the main mountain ranges of Mt. Olympus, the Bailey Range and the high peaks along the eastern side of the park. It also includes much of the rain forest river valleys on the west end of the park the Bogachiel, the Hoh, Queets

and Quinault.

Three additional, smaller roadless areas were studied for possible wilderness designation. A 26, 800 acre roadless area is detached from the main roadless area by the Hurricane Ridge Road and the old Hurricane Ridge road from the Elwha. Mt. Angeles is the most prominent natural feature in this area.

The Pacific Coastal Area, Rep. Hansen said, is divided into two roadless areas of lesser size. These are narrow, elongated areas of some 13 1/2 to 20 miles in length and only a mile to several miles in width. They are the most primitive remaining areas along


in the særvice of their country.

Jack Chinook boost local sport fishing

These fish are legal to take downstream from markers approxi mately 1200 feet downstream from the mouth of Soleduck Hatchery Creek Salmon over 28 inches taken upstream from the lowermost Highway 101 bridge must be Coho (Silvers). The bag and pos session limit in any one day is six salmon not less than 10 inches; not more than two may exceed 28 inches. A salmon punch card is needed to catch

or possess any salmon.

Many of the Jack Salmon this year are marked with a coded wire tag in the head and an adipose fin clip (the small fin on top in front of the tail). If the fin is missing there is a reward system for the tagged salmon, and money may be earned by turning in the heads at Olympic Sporting Goods in Forks or at Soleduck Salmon

lost due to these thermostats. There is still one more prohiem: since we moved here. I recall being in someone else's home and noticing that they had the same thermostats. This was before I saw your article, or they certainly would have been warned at the time. I don't know where it was that I saw them, and it bothers me enough to ask you to please

Defective units manufactured by the White - Rodgers Co. have been blamed for most of the Oregon fires caused by electric heat thermostats

Approximately 90 percent of 76 fires started by malfunctioning thermostats in 1972 were from White - Rodgers wall models made from 1959 to 1963, Frank Kauble, a spokesman for the state fire marshal said. The defective thermostati caused two blazes in Multno-

mah County Fire District No. 10 Lt. Harold Demoret, district investigator, reported. Demoret suggested that such units be replaced in buildings.

The problem stems from plastic insulation in the units being destroyed chemically over a period of years, leading to a short circuit and fire. "No one knows for certain how

long it takes for the insulation t break down," Demoret noted. The company released a safety bulletin several years ago explain ing the problem, but "replacement is at the discretion and expense of the homeowner." Kauble said. Made for a number of electric heat manufacturers, the thermostats have different brand names The units have black plastic insulation and identification under the coverplate with the letters XY, or AA followed by a two-digit

Units made by the company with gray, beige or dark brown plastic insulation do not require replacement, according to authorities. LETTER TO EDITOR:
