More accurate method F developed for measuring

timber

A more accurate method of measuring timber in the woods has been developed by the Bureau of Land Management in cooperation with Forest Service researchers. The new technique, called "fall, buck, and scale cruising" or FBS cruising, is currently being used by ALM in the Pacific Northfor timber sales.

The technique is especially applicable in old-growth timber such as west-side Douglas-fir forests, according to Floyd John. son, a biometrician at the Forest Service's Pacific Northwest Forest and Range Experiment Station in Portland, Johnson says

as they come out of the woods, a common practice for the Forest Service and other agencies. Johnston and George Hartman, BLM timber appraisal specialist

in Portland, have been working with foresters in the two agencies to help test the system and put it into use. "We're shooting for a 5 percent sampling error or less on each FBS volume estimate. says Harrtman. About 25 percent of the volume

involves using a highly efficient sampling system to select from 50 to 200 sample trees from thousands in a sale area. These trees are felled, bucked into standard log lengths, and measured on the ground. Because the center (of the tree is then open for vieww, determination of defect, bbreakage, taper, and other faactors can be made more accurateely than in standing trees.





Fire danger may force land closure

"Due to the extremely critical fire hazard condition throughout the Pacific Northwest it may be necessary to close forested areas east of the Cascade crest in Washington to public entry," Commissioner of Public Lands Bert L Cole announced today. Cole said that he and Paul Krauss, Supervisor of the Department of Natural Resources Fire Control Division are evaluating the situation daily in conjunction with the U.S. Forest Service.

If the action is taken it would close the dove and pigeon hunting season that normally begins September 1st. The closure would mean that motoring, hiking, horse back riding, or any other form of travel on forest roads and trails, including cross country travel. would not be permitted. Camping, fishing, berry picking, etc., would also be prohibited if travel over forest roads, trails, or cross country is required. Boaters would be required to confine their access to shores with improved campgrounds or areas free of combustible material. Recreationists would still be able t use state parks or designated campgrounds, as long as trav-! to the area was over country

roads or state highways. Cole said that if moisture conditons improve and the fire danger lessens, the action will not be taken. There are no major fires presently burning in Washington, but Idaho, Oregon and Montana are battling serious fires and the danger potential in Washington is very high. A case of great significance t the Department of Game, which will affect the Department's steelhead management and propagation program is being heard in Federal Court in Tacoma.

The case is brought by the U. S. Government on behalf of twelve Indian tribes of the State against the State of Washington. including the Department of Game.

It is anticipated that the trial of this matter, which involves claim on off reservation Indian fishing treaties and fishing rights will last three to four weeks.

Judge George H. Boldt is expected to render a decision concerning this important question approximately one month after the end of the trial.

Grants approved for recreation

SHERPA **PROGRAM**

A new approach to an old problem is being tried in the park this summer, according to Roger W. Allin, Superintendent of Olympic National Park. The problem is to find a way to reduce the impact on the backcountry environment caused by the Park Service's use of aircraft and pack stock.

The solution being tried: backpackers. Working with members of the Sierra Club. the park has set up a program dubbed the "Sherpa Program" after the famous Himalayan porters - to supply backcountry rangers and trail crews who are ordinarily supplied by air or pack animals. The eight "Sherpas"

all college age and including two girls, are all, working with So far their work has been im-

pressive. They have supplied the rangers stationed at Seven Lakes Basin and Enchanted Valley, hauled garbage out of Cat Basin and off the ocean beaches, packed old telephone wire out of the Elwha, hauled cedar puncheon for the Sand Point Trail at Lake Ozette, and packed 450 pounds of trail maintenance equipment from Deer Lake to Heart One of their latest tasks has

been a cooperative project with another Sierra Club work party. This second volunteer group has been restoring and cleaning up backcountry camp sites in the Cameron, Dosewallips and Grey Wolf drainages. The Sherpas will pack supplies in to the clean up group and pack accumulated trash back out.

A tremendous job of torest and range fire suppression has been and is being accomplished by the agencies involved. Hot, dry and at times windy conditions, along with extremely hazardous forest and range fuel conditions has amde the fire fighting job a herculian one. Good planning and preparedness, prompt action, new techniques and even the use of women on the fire lines has all added up to much accomplishment, often under most difficult

"In order to produce beef as inexpensively as possible, we have no alternative but to go to a cheaper source of feed (than grain), " Dyer says.

He believes that grain will never again become an economical livestock feet unless the federal government bans grain exports. "As long as we market world-wide . . . we will likely always have a grain deficiency. Fortunately, the world-wide

grain shortage is developing on the heels of research which already points the way to a potential new livestock feed which is available in enormous quantities and which apparently can be econically converted into feed. Dyer has been researching converting cellulose-containing, lowgrade agricultural wastes into livestock feed since 1955 when he

joined the WSU Agricultural Research Center.

It was apparent to him even then that the world would run short of grain. His research initially was conducted on the cellulose in wheat straw, and he jound that it could be a good source of livestock feed. But straw has to be gathered from vast areas to accumulate enough tonnage to

make processing economical. Thus far it hasn't been economically feasible to tap this source of cellulose for fattening cattle. However, about four years ago Dyer and the Weverhaeuser Company independently became interested in the possibility of utilizing the cellulose in wood as a livestock feed. In June, 1969, Weyerhaeuser contracted with WSU for research on the sub-

Weverhaeuser provides the wood products and \$15,000 a year WSU provides the livestock, facilities, scientists and other overhead. Dyer's research involved several trials annually, involving both steers and lambs. Although he has not researched

the products as a potential dairy feed, he feels they would be valuable in dairy rations. Dyer has fed wood, newsprint and higher-quality paper. Presently he is feeding the higherquality paper.

Dyer said all of the wood products have to be cooked before animals can digest them. Wood products are largely cellulose and lignin. The lignin and cellulose are chemically bound together, with lignin accounting for 20 to 30 percent of the wood. Lignin prohibits enzymes in the digestive tract of animals

from breaking down the cellulose as part of the digestive process. Dyer has found that by reducing the lignin content to 4 to 5 percent, the wood and paper become good livestock feed. They would be even better feed if lignin was completely re-

moved, but Dyer said the amount of cooking which that requires is not economical.

Research indicates the rations in which wood and paper replaces grain produces about 86 percent as fast a daily rate of gain in cattle and sheep as do conventional rations which utilize grain as a high-energy source. Dyer said if the animals are carried longer on wood than animals on grain rations they will finish out about the same. If slaughtered after the same number of days on feed, the wood-fed

A RESOLUTION of the Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, declaring the intention of the Town Council to improve a certain area by the construction and installation of a sanitary sewer system therein, and by doing all work necessary in connection therewith, and fixing a time, date and place for a hearing on this resolution

of intention. BE IT RESOLVED by the Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, as

Section 1. It is the intention of the Town Council of the Town of Forks, Washington, to order the improvement of the area bounded as set forth in Exhibit "A" attached hereto and inacquisition, construction and installation of a sanitary sewer system within such area as set forth in Exhibit "B" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, by the construction of the Town of Forks sewage treatment plant, as described in Exhibit "C", attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein, and by the acquisition, construction and installation of the trunk sewer system described in Exhibit "D" attached hereto and incorporated by reference herein.

Such improvements shall be installed complete with all manholes, stub sewers and other equipment and appurtenances including pumping stations necessary to the proper operation of said sewer system all as more fully described/in the preliminary plans therefor, prepared by Lee Johnson and Assoc. Inc. consulting engineers of Everett, Washington, and now on file

with the Town. The Town shall acquire by purchase, franchise, lesse or condemnation all property both real and personal or any interest therein and all rights of way, franchises, permits and easements which may be found necessary to acquire, construct and install any abovedescribed improvements.

It is hereby further provided that the hereinbefore authorized plans of improvement shall be subject to such changes as to details of pipe size and location or any other details of said plans not affecting the service to be provided by the main general plan as shall be authorized by the Town Council either prior to or during the actual course of construction.

It is the intention of the City Council to form a utility local improvement district within the area bounded as set forth above.

Section 2. It is the intention of the Town Council that assessments shall be made against the property within the above-described boundaries in accordance with the special benefits derived by virtue of the aforesaid improvements.

Section 3. The Town's consulting engineers, Lee Johnson and Assoc., Inc., Everett, Washington, are hereby directed to submit to the Council at or prior to the date fixed for the hearing on this resolution a statement of the Calawah Way from 5th Avenue N. E. estimated cost and expense of such improvements, the portion of such cost to be borne by the property within Thomas Addition to Town of Forks. the proposed improvement district, the local improvement district assess ments outstanding and unpaid against the property therein, and the aggregate actual valuation of the improvements in the proposed district according to the valuation last placed upon it for the purposes of general taxation, together with a diagram or print showing the East Line Section 3, then Westerly thereon the lots, tracts, parcels of land and other property which will be specially benefited by said improvements, and the estimated amount of the cost and expense thereof to be borne by each lot, tract or parcel of land or other property within the proposed improvement district.

Section 4. It is proposed that not to exceed 60% of the total estimated costs of said improvements of \$30,083 shall be assessed against the property specially benefited thereby. Such assessments shall be for the sole pur ose of payment into such revenue

bond fund as may hereafter be specified by the Town Council for the payment of revenue bonds to be issued to de ray the cost of the acquisition, consion of Centerline of Block 8, Plat of struction and installation of the aforesaid improvements.

Section 5. Check cashing outlined

In the world of crime they re called "paper hangers." But as many businessmen and retailers have found out, bad check artists can do a good job of redecorating ledger books in red ink as well. Exact losses are hard to pin down, but one source estimates that in the United States more than a billion dollars worth of goods services and cash was stolen last year through the use of "rubber" checks.

For businessmen who find that competition makes check cashing for either sales or customer accommodation a necessity, protection from bad check losses is available under a Merchant's Check Cashing Forgery Bond, according to the Insurance Information Institute.

In order to qualify for the

coverage, the businessman must install equipment that will photograph the person cashing the check, the check itself and any piece of identification offered. In addition, the retailer must lay down ground rules for personnel who cash checks. They must make sure that each check cashed has on it the address and phone number of the person for whom it


This allows a merchant to cash payroll checks as a courtesy to customers and pick up added payday business. Postal money orders and express money orders are also

covered up to the \$200 limit. The economy is depending less and less on cash, notes the Institute, and as long as checks are used, the forgery problem will exist.
