FORKS ELKS

Today I am more or less going to write an open letter to all members of the Elks, and those unaffiliated Elks, men who have dropped out. The Proposed Forks Elks Lodge needs you and your help. On March 15, 1975, the Forks Elks Lodge will be instituted in Forks. This is the date the Grand Lodge has set as our do-or-die date. By then we must have the required membership and be ready to become a Lodge. So, this is where you fellows come in. I know that you want to see this Lodge go the same as I. But like most of us, you are sitting back to see if it is going to take or not, as most of us are afraid that if we join the Forks Lodge, our membership in the Elks is out the window if the Lodge isn't instituted. Well, this isn't so. According to Section 192 of the

Annotated Statutes of the Grand

Lodge, a member of any Lodge may take a transfer dimit from his present lodge to join a new lodge that is being formed. The way that this is done, you join the new Proposed Lodge, then 30 days prior to the institution date, a transfer dimit is applied for from your present lodge. Now, if in this 30 day period the new lodge doesn't jell, then your present lodge drops your transfer dimit, and you retain your membership in your present lodge. So, you
